Telford's Goal Instrumental Midgets' 2nd Cobourg Win

Foghorns, cowbells, and trumpets didn't rattle Georgetown Midgets who took a 2-1 lead in the best of five All-Ontario Midget A championship round by defeating Cobourg 5-3 here Sunday.

Cobourg rooters made up a fair slice of the 800 fans who crowded into Georgetown Memorial Arena to watch the tussle — but they weren't as numerous as the noise-making in the stands.

Using foghorns and every other device necessary for a well equipped 'new-years-evening party, the Cobourg customers kept the steel beam rattles vibrating and peebably added an inch to every stride by players on both sides.

After Brent Telford's winning goal with less than four minutes remaining the ruckus subsided to a single periodic hunk that sounded more like the bleat of a wounded goat than a rallying blast.

Telford's goal marked the third and final time that Georgetown had taken the lead in the game. Cobourg's drive to pull even for the third time was deflated when Simon Llewellyn scored Georgetown's fifth marker with a minute and twenty seconds to go.

The visitors netted the only goal of the evenly-played first period when Comeau fooled goalie Brian Peavoy with a shoulder-high shot that Peavoy mistook with his glove hand. The unassisted marker came at 8:24.

It took Georgetown just 58 seconds of the second period to even the score. Dave Shepard set it up with a pass through the crease to Stan Kynersley who rapped it home from the corner of the net.

Billy Dwyer gave Georgetown the shove they needed to capture the lead when he shook his check, skated alone in front of the Cobourg net and swept Jan Popiel's pass from the boards into a bottom corner at 18:14.

Ronaldelf from Massey and Kelly made it a new game with about five minutes of the third period gone, and touched off a wave of scoring that produced five third period goals.

A hard shot by Jan Popiel from just inside the blue line was too hot to be handled and Georgetown took a 3-2 lead at 20:08. It was Popiel's second attempt from the same spot in seconds. Moments before he let a bullet go that cleared the top of the cage.

Hambidge crased the advantage with his counter from close range at 12:16 that came off one of the few Cobourg penetrations of the period.

Telford's winner was a slapshot that threaded a forest of bodies enroute from the blue line. Llewellyn's insurance contribution was a waist-high slider from fifteen feet in front.
