## School Water Problem Board Seeks Solution

Board members of the North Halton Retarded Children's association are concerned about the quality of the water at Sunshine School — they have branded it as undrinkable. A member of the committee said the group that the well supplying the water may have been dug too deep which has caused the water to come too salty. At any rate, said the spokesman, something has to be done about it. Chairman Dr. K. W. McCauley of Georgetown suggested that an expert be brought in to look into the situation. He noted that a water softener will be required soon because the pipes at the school are becoming blocked due to the high mineral content of the water. He suggested that a shallower well would be the answer to a better drinking water. He urged the members to find some one in the area who has had a similar problem and seek advice. Plans were formulated to hold an open house at the six rooms school May 3rd, from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. Members were told that this will be the week before National Retarded Children's Week and the open house will bring the school to the attention of the public before the campaign for funds is under way. A general meeting is to be held on May 12th at which Brian Holliday, co-ordinator for special services for Ontario Association for Retarded Children, will address the group on the forthcoming John V. Kennedy Memorial Fund. He will also discuss the new Provincial Grants next January. Dr. McCauley brought a charcoal portrait of the late President to the school which will be hung in the auditorium. The chairman told the members that Canadian Artist Shaw sent an original of the charcoal drawing to Mrs. Kennedy and she approved it. He said that the sketch is to be sent to all 60 local branches of ORCA. It is also to be used in the forthcoming memorial fund campaign, he said. A portrait of the late president will be sent anyone who gives a donation toward the fund, he explained. The 11th Annual Meeting of ORCA will be held at the Village Inn Hotel at Sarnia April 24-25. Five members of the North Halton branch will attend. Members were told last night that North Trafalgar Community Club donated two new electric sewing machines to the school. A further one is expected soon announced Mrs. R. P. A. Jaffares, principal of Sunshine. The principal said the sewing machines are used by the pupils at the school as part of their manual training. The pupils make pillow cases and

laundry bags, etc., which are later sold at the annual bazaar in June.
