

No Longer Just a Nuisance—Now It's Risking Death

Traffic volume on the double-track Canadian National Railway through town has begun to swell toward the estimated sixty-five trains daily that will pass through here next year when the marshalling yard at Maple goes into operation.

CN Inspector John Eagles told the Herald that there are more trains running through Georgetown now than ever before in its history consequent to the chances of a trespassing fatality have paralleled the increase.

Spot checks are being made

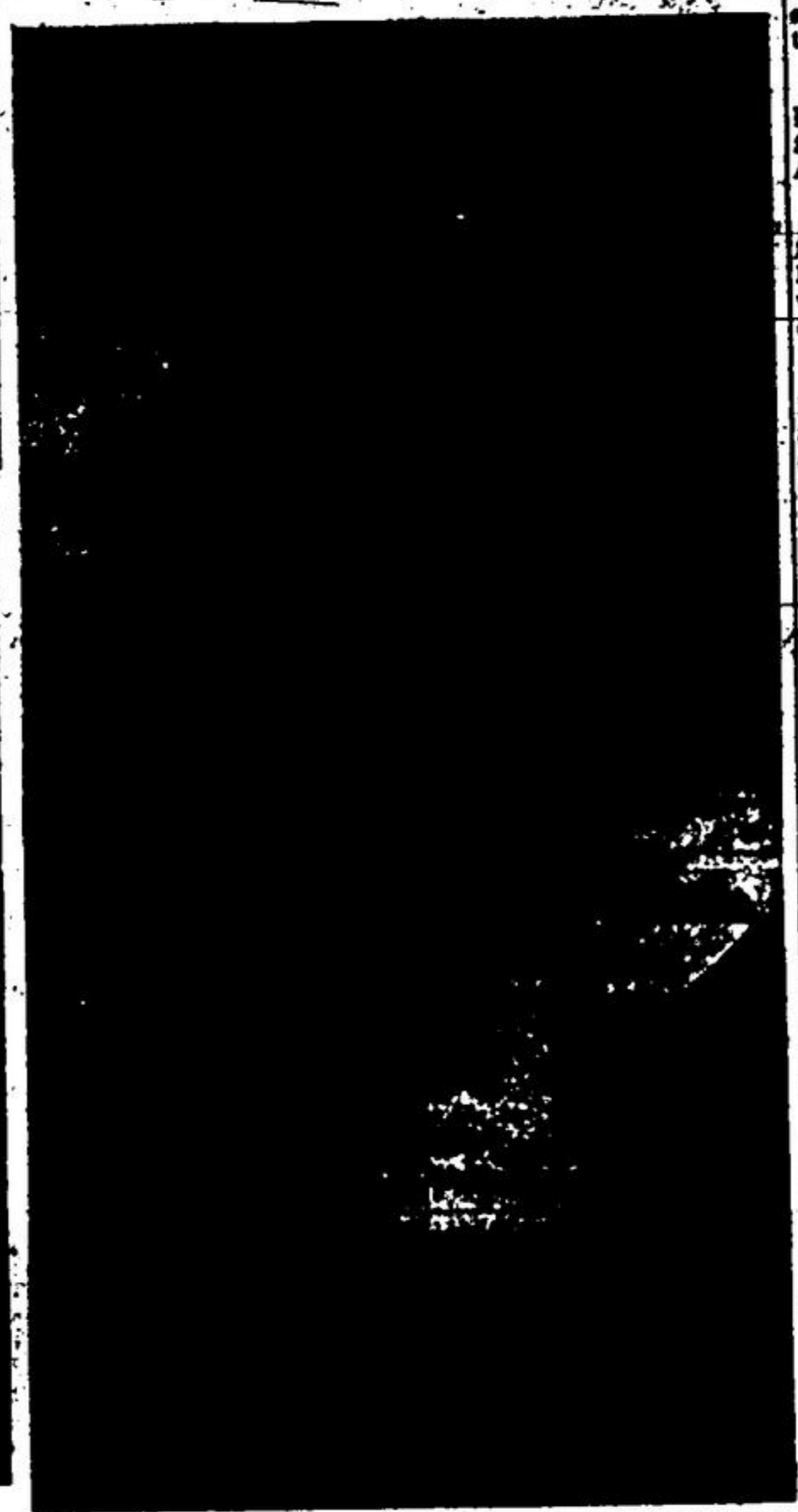
now in an effort to discourage adults and children still taking shortcuts through CN property and these will be intensified as the marshalling yard completion date gets closer.

A few years ago children playing on box cars and walking the rails were the cause of extensive damage and a nuisance. Now their presence in the area of rail traffic could have grimmer results.

Inspector Eagles said the sore spots here are opposite the coating mills where both adults and children are crossing

several sets of tracks, and at the end of Temple Rd. where school children, despite warnings, have created a short cut to and from Chapel St. school.

The inspector pointed out trespassers are exposing themselves to possible heavy fines under the railway act and criminal code. Some will probably feel the sting of the penalty in the ensuing weeks as the CN police carry out their crack down. As one man put it, "with a steady stream of trains pouring through here soon, let's hope that's all that happens to them."

Town Students Compete Safety Poster Contest

Illustrating a variety of themes, posters from local school children are competing against nearly 16,000 from schools throughout Canada and the United States for prizes worth \$3,725.

Last year five Burlington pupils received honourable mention certificates for their posters as well as cash awards from the Hamilton Automobile Club.

District youngsters illustrated their posters on either of the themes: "Watch for Turning Cars" and "Walk on Left Facing Traffic." They compete against others on their own school-grade level.
