Businessman Served Town As Reeve and Fire Chief

A former Georgetown reeve and fire chief, Norman H. Brown, 70, of 88 Guelph Street, died on April 10th in Georgetown nursing home.
Mr. Brown served five terms as a councillor, from 1933 to 1942, and was reeve in 1943. As a volunteer fireman, he was chief of the department in the thirties.
Born at Norval Station, he was the son of James Brown and Mary May. He attended public school in Norval and after farming for a few years apprenticed to a Milton bakerhop. He had his own shop in Higgswater, then returned to Georgetown where with his wife he operated a bakerhop in what is now the Norton building and then as the McGillibon Hotel.
After selling his business, he was employed at Donat's Paper Mill, was a real estate salesman, and for the past ten years operated a taxi business.
His wife, Jean Ross died three years ago. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. Ernie Arnold, (Irene), of Toronto and Mrs. John Muckart (Nancy), Georgetown; two brothers Gordon, Stewarttown and George, Norval and a sister Gertrude, Mrs. D. H. Lindsay, Acton.
Rev. Ian Fleming conducted the funeral service on Monday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Lawrence May, Douglas Herrington, Fire Chief Ernie Lewis, Joe Ross, J. W. (Jack) Armstrong and Mayor Joseph Gibbons. Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.

Teacher 53 Years Resident Authored Grammar Text

Fifty-three years as a public and high school teacher was the proud record of Duncan Alexander Baxter, 84, who died in Georgetown Hospital April 11. He co-authored a grammar text used in Manitoba schools and was a B.A. graduate of the University of Manitoba.
Mr. Baxter's record spanned from a one-room school in Neesagaweya Township to principalship of a 40-room school in Transcona, Manitoba. And after retiring as principal at Neesagaweya, he continued as a substitute teacher in Toronto for another five years.
A native of the 4th Line, Caledon, he was the son of Malcolm and Ann Baxter. In 1877 he taught at Alken School and two sisters, Mrs. R. Sadler in Neesagaweya and for the next six years in schools in the Caledon area. He was a member of the star football team which won championship honours.
He later taught at Yonhill, then in Minnetonka, Minnecota and Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. He was selected by the Dept. of Education to head the Transcona school which, with 40 rooms, was of record size and he held that post until 1938. He returned to Ontario to be Cookstown principal.
He made his home in Brampton from 1948 until 1960 when he moved to Georgetown where his son is vice-principal at Georgetown High School.
His wife, Margaret McLaren, whom he married in 1905 died five years ago. He leaves his son, A. McLaren Baxter, 53 King St. E., Georgetown, two daughters, Mrs. W. J. Hyde (Verne) and Mrs. D. A. Elliott (Odell) Toronto; a sister, Mrs. Edith Lindsay, Orangeville; grandchildren Blake Baxter, Georgetown, Duncan Baxter, Kitchener, William Richard, Marilyn, Joan and Robert Hyde, Toronto; and two great-grandchildren, Larry and Lorene Baxter, Kitchener.
Rev. Howard Pentland conducted the funeral service on Tuesday at the McKillop Funeral Home, Brampton with interment in the 4th Line Cemetery, Caledon. Among floral tributes was one from the 1918 graduating class at Transcona.

Ballinfad District Man Veteran of First War

Death came suddenly to H. A. (Harry) Smith, 66 at his home, R. R. 1 Georgetown on Wednesday, April 8th. He had not been in the best of health for some time and was home from hospital only two weeks prior to a fatal heart attack just after finishing his noon-day meal.
He was born in Nash, Buckinghamshire, England in 1898. He came to Canada in 1923 after serving in the Imperial army in the first war. He was wounded by shrapnel and spent some time in the old Christie St. hospital where a successful skin graft operation was performed. He was a member of the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 120, Canadian Legion.
He leaves his brother Frank with whom he made his home, also brothers Jesse and Albert of the Ballinfad community. He leaves his sister Mrs. W. Grey in England.
A Legion service was held Friday evening at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. Rev. Kelvin Johnston, branch chaplain, conducted the service on Saturday. Pallbearers were three nephews, Dennis Smith, Arton, David Smith and Ken McBride, Milton, and neighbours Ernest McEnery, Lloyd Marshall and Garnet Sinclair. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

Four Motor Accidents Week's Traffic Toll

A re-occurring collision on Guelph St. at Windsor Road Monday was the most serious of 4 accidents investigated over the past week by Georgetown Police.
The cars were driven by Harold Vodo Janssen, 38 Shelby St., and Harry Creamer Wood, 28 Main St. West.
A police report said the Janssen car was stopped in the westbound lane on Guelph St. waiting to make a left turn on to Windsor Road when the Wood car collided with the rear end.
Cpl. R. D. Whitson handled the investigation and placed property damage at \$350 to Janssen's 1964 Volkswagen, and \$150 to the 1963 Peugeot driven by Wood.
Thursday, cars driven by John Cunningham, 8 Academy Road, and Joan Ann Bruce, of Campbellville collided on John St. West on the approach to the south end of the CNR culvert.
Cunningham's Volvo took \$100 damage and the 1932 Volkswagen driven by Mrs. Bruce, the same amount.
Cunningham was westbound and Mrs. Bruce eastbound when their cars met at a light corner.
Your hundred dollars was the total damage in an accident Friday involving a 1966 Meteor driven by Donald James McNiven, 45 Main St. N., and a 1963 Dodge driven by Harold Hix, Glen Williams.
The cars collided on Glen Road at the entrance to Smith and Stone Ltd. Hills was leaving the lot at the time.
An accident late Saturday night did damage to cars driven by David Edward Shannon, R. H. Acton, and Henry Walama, Glen Williams, at the intersection of Guelph St. and Mountainview Road.
Shannon was travelling west on Guelph St. and Walama north on Mountainview. Cat. Evan Rollins estimated damage at \$250 to the 1960 Meteor driven by Shannon and \$150 to Walama's 1958 Buick.

Road, Dust Complaints It's 'That Time of Year'

Spring arrived officially for Georgetown council Monday when roads, dust and street lighting were topics discussed by ratepayers.
First Harrison Wood arrived and launched a tirade on Delrex roads. He is billing the town for damage to his car, he said, wants road work done on Bairrow Crescent and demanded immediate action at the Rexway-highway corner.
John Henley reiterated some of his neighbour's complaints. Next was Ted Francis who, after successfully seeking a street light on Keata, criticized a \$35,000 expense for police and complained about the high cost of government.
The reeve draws \$1000.00 from the town and \$2400 from the county; the deputy reeve a total of \$3300, and each councillor \$1000. What do we get for our money?" he asked.
Cr. Emmerson made a spirited defence of the police force. There were 2117 complaints investigated last year, he said. The town is often short-staffed when policemen have to appear in Milton court and he is trying to have a court established here so new will be available more of the time for patrol.
Remarks about salaries roused the ire of three councillors.
"I have no more money than I had before I was a councillor," claimed Cr. Jim Young, pointing to nine dances he is expected to attend. "And we are hit for every donation that comes along."
Cr. Bob Francis said he had worked out his council remuneration to the end of March at 41c an hour.
Reeve Elliott disputed the figure of \$3400 and said this could be checked with the county treasurer. Georgetown's share of county costs is only 3 per cent, he said, and there is a 50 per cent government subsidy on some meetings which means the town treasury is only paying 50c for these.
Douglas Cole, Guelph St., complained by letter about a dust nuisance from the municipal parking lot, which was relayed to the Parking Authority.
