Homebrew Rule Hurts Hornby Redshirts Would Lose Pitcher

A proposed rule which would make it illegal for any club in the Halton County Softball Association to use other than local talent will be discussed shortly at a general meeting of the association.

The meeting has been scheduled for a club official indicated that it would be held in about two weeks time.

The rule to be discussed would prohibit any club from using players that do not live within a seven-mile radius of the community.

This rule was reported to have been introduced at the very founding of the league but was overlooked by some teams in their quest to keep players who moved away from their area.

The general feeling at the moment among the clubs is that if such a rule were enforced it would assure local boys a chance to make the team, after they became too old for minor baseball.

The meeting will also iron out any other problems for the upcoming season as well as draw up a constitution.
