

Furs Became Minesweeper Jackets Projects Recalled at Anniversary

A dinner was held at the Knox Presbyterian Church Hall, with 23 members and guests present. The tables were decorated with red, white and blue flower arrangements, small Union Jacks and Canadian Red Ensigns were also placed on the tables. The Chapter's Standard was placed by the head table.

Each lady as she entered the hall signed the guest book and was presented with a corsage of white roses with a large ribbon. Mrs. K. Penrice, President, greeted each guest as she arrived. The Chapter was on display.

The dinner started by all standing to sing the Queen and the Prayer of the Order. Among those present were past Regent, Mrs. J. McLintock, Mrs. Walter Biehn, Miss Ruth Evans, Mrs. P. Leslie, Miss Hilda Irwin and Mrs. J. T. Armstrong. Mrs. Keith Barber who was the first Regent, Mrs. W. Thompson, Mrs. E. Mackenzie, past members Mrs. H. Hancock, Mrs. J. L. Lambert, Mrs. R. F. During the dinner Miss H. MacDonald, Secretary, read highlights from the 25 years, recalling such incidents as the milk fund that was established in 1940 and continued 3 1/2 years. Milk was delivered daily to the public school for children who were thought by the school nurse to be in need of this. Work done during the war years such as paper drives, salvage campaigns, and on one occasion when six cartons of furs were collected and sent to Greece to be made into minesweeper jackets. Approximately \$3,000 was raised for war work.

One money-making project was a "mile of pennies" and on one occasion a thunderstorm came up without warning and washed all the pennies down the drain! The Health Clinic was first undertaken in 1948 and is still assisted by members of the Chapter. The Chapter supports UNICEF; has a High School Bureau which was started in 1940 at \$10 a year and at the present time is \$20 a year. The Valentine Dance which has run for almost as many as the 25 years. The IODE furnished a room in the local hospital, and since has added other items to the room.

The Secretary ended her report by reading a copy of the very first newspaper report on the IODE, printed in the Georgetown Herald, April 19, 1928. The report was on the Charter Night held at the McGibbon Hotel on April 11th, 1928.

The speaker for the evening was Mrs. Leonard May of Kingston, Provincial Councilor IODE. She spoke of IODE work and discussed at length the Prayer of the Order. At the end of her very interesting speech she was presented with a gift by Miss Hilda Irwin.

Mrs. May then presented 25 year pins to Mrs. W. Thompson, Mrs. J. D. Kelly and Miss Hilda Irwin. Miss Ann Hickley, unfortunately a patient in the hospital, also a 25-year member, was not present, but her pin was presented the next day in the hospital by Mrs. Penrice.

Greetings were brought from the Duke of Devonshire Chapter, Arton by Mrs. H. Foran, Regent and from the Lakeside Chapter, Arton; Mrs. Buchanan who was also present at the first dinner of Charter Night. Mrs. Hancock, a past member and past Regent and Charter member of Highland Creek Chapter which she formed after leaving Georgetown, also brought greetings from her Chapter.

The Anniversary Cake was cut by Mrs. Wallace Thompson, Charter Member, past Regent and a 25-year member.

The evening ended with musical entertainment by members Mrs. H. Wrigglesworth, Mrs. G. Kilday, accompanied by Mrs. J. Evans and two dance solos by Miss Rita Timms.

The evening concluded with all members standing to sing "O Canada."

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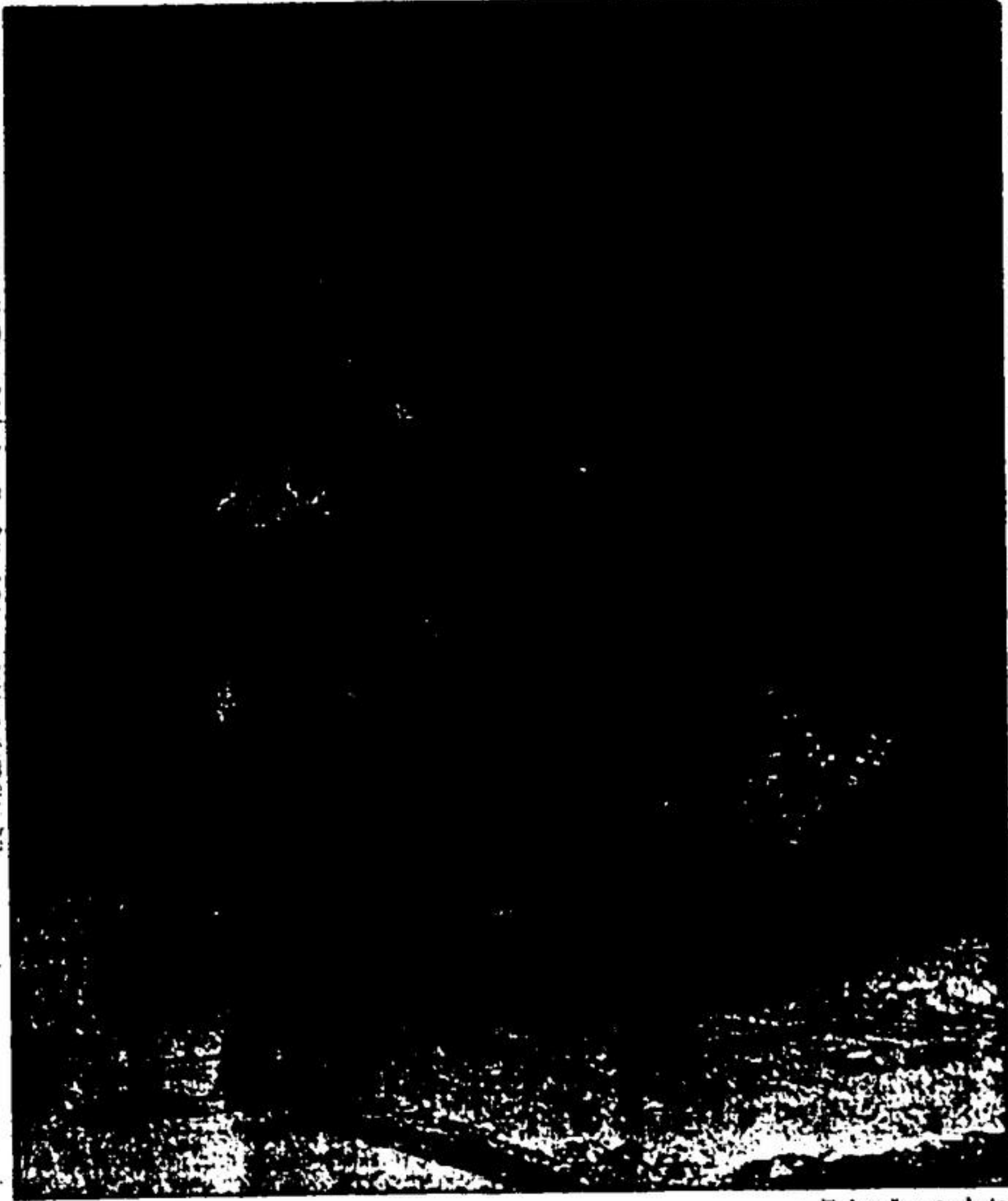

Employment activity maintained a brisk pace throughout the month of March with jobs being found for 343 persons by the National Employment Service. This is a considerable increase over March last year when jobs were found for 279 persons.

At the end of March, 1964, there were 1873 persons registered for work at the Brampton Office, down 166 from the end of last month and a drop of 191 from the number registered at the end of March last year.

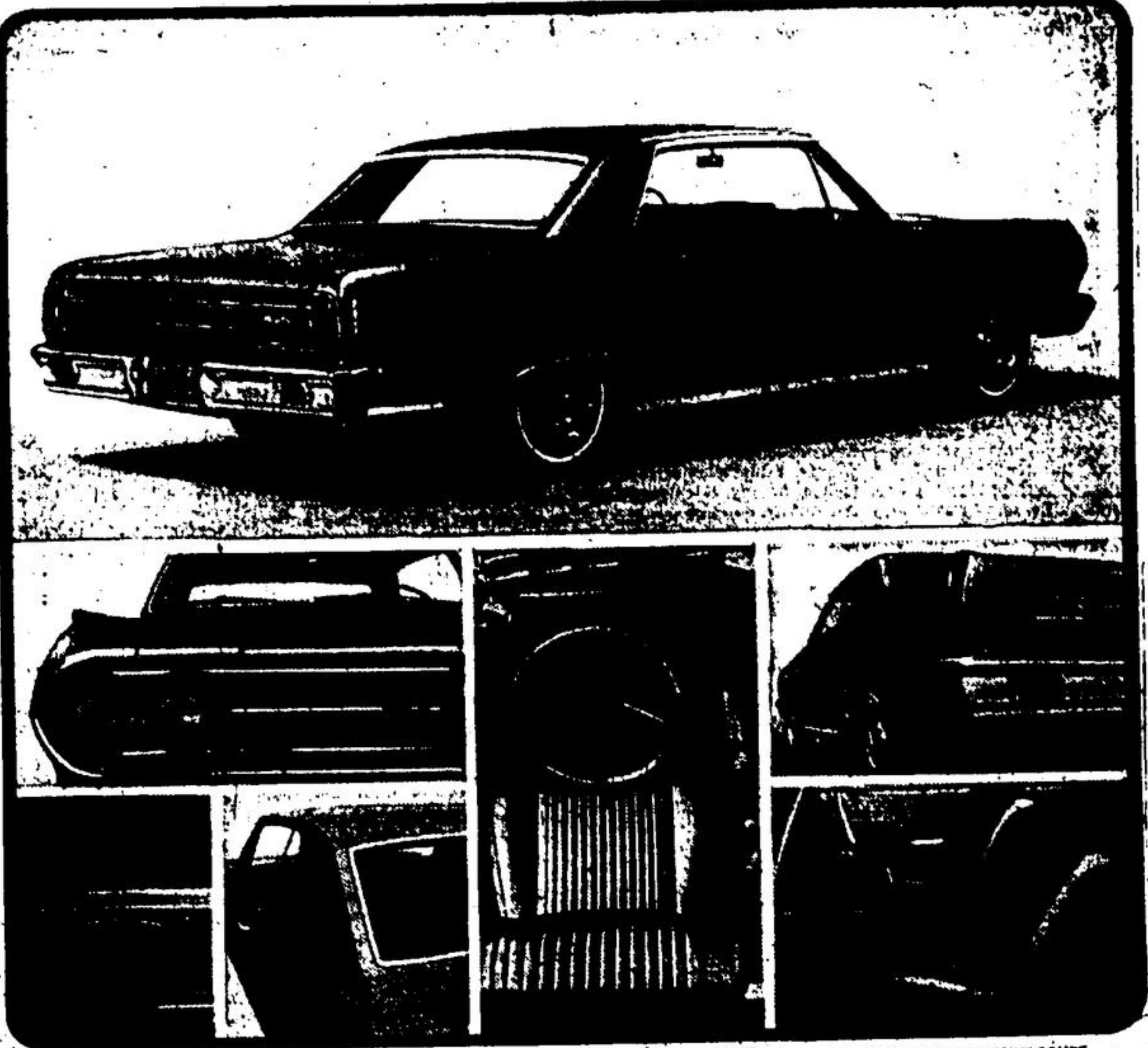
