## The Georgetown Gardener

### Green Thumb Just a Myth

This business about green thumbs, mysterious ability and luck is overdone. Anyone can become a good gardener and grow anything that will grow in Canada if he takes a little care. Gardening should not be hard work and a lot of muscle is not required. The real secret of success, of having marvelous flowers and tender, crisp vegetables, of getting rid of weeds, bugs and disease, is remarkably simple. It can be summed up in one short sentence; give your garden a little regular attention and at the right time. The last part is the most important.

There is no trouble in controlling weeds if they are removed when they are small. The worst bug or disease can be defeated in minutes if we spray or dust at the first sign of trouble. There should be little difficulty with drought if we do a little cultivating early and if we water well and shade when transplanting. The main thing is to give attention at the right time, to water when it is needed, not after it is too late.

to cultivate before the ground starts to bake, to thin before the plants become crowded, to give some support before a storm comes along and smashes the tall flowers. The man who advised a ditch in time saves time must have been a gardener and a good one.

**YIMMELY YIPS**

A garden calendar or diary is an excellent idea. This need only be a few slips of paper attached to any calendar at certain future dates or one can use a desk calendar or diary. In this we note jobs to be done, seed or shrubs to be bought and planted, new systems to be adopted at some time ahead. It is simply a reminder so that we get more pleasure, interest and value out of our gardening operations.

Gardeners who want to get the most of their hobby, make a regular practice to plan every spring one vegetable and one flower that they have never tried before. In this way they add to their experience, enrich their garden and often discover something that is real and permanent addition to the flower garden or the table.

## Ag Representative, 2 Others Leave Department Office

A new Agricultural Representative and two others have left the Department of Agriculture, following the resignations of the three men presently working in the office.

Agricultural Representative J. Allen Francis, Assistant Ag. Rep. Douglas Burnside, and Fruit and Vegetable Specialist Karl F. Muir resigned this month and have gone into partnership on a 613-acre farm at North Cobalt, 100 miles north of North Bay, presently Associate Ag. Rep. in Wellington County, will take over as Halton Ag. Rep. on May 1. At the same time, Fruit and Vegetable Extension Specialist Andrew Kilenberger who is stationed at the Vineland Horticultural Station will be transferred to Halton.

Mr. Muir began working as Ag. Rep. in Halton

and Peel Counties in May 1957 and became Halton Ag. Rep. in April 1959 at the retirement of the late J. Earl Whitlock. Earlier he graduated from O.A.C. in 1949 and besides working on the family farm near Renfrew, had spent two and a half years as assistant rep. at South Simcoe county, and five years as associate rep. in Hastings.

Doug Burnside came to Halton and Peel Counties in May 1951 as assistant rep. Earl Muir began working as assistant Fruit and Vegetable Specialist in Halton, Peel, York and part of Wentworth Counties in 1955, and has been the specialist since 1956.

## Awarded Fellowship Studies in England

Dr. Richard Philip, currently completing doctoral studies in pharmacology at the University of Western Ontario, has been awarded a \$5,000 post-doctoral fellowship in aviation medicine by the Defence Research Board.
