Mr. Halward began by commenting on the various trees on Georgetown streets. He suggested a tree replanting program be undertaken to ensure the streets do not become denuded when the elm and very old maples die and have to be cut down. He gave impetus to this idea by handing out packages of various tree seeds gathered from trees grown at the Royal Botanical Gardens in Hamilton.

The packages contained, among others, seeds from the Catalpa, Birch, Washington Thorn, Mountain Ash, Yellowwood and the Japanese Cork Tree.
