Won't Pay Costs, Will Yank Township Hydrants

There may be some puzzled dogs on the 7th Line, opposite North Halton golf course, as a result of a motion passed at Council Monday night. The motion calls for the removal of the first hydrants from the front of the township homes on the 7th Line.

The water lines and the hydrants were installed in 1960 when the homes were built. "Requering Township has turned us down flatly on our request that they pay the maintenance and rental," stated Coun. J. Young. "While some of our town residents in the Church and 'William' Street areas have no fire hydrants," he added.

Both Coun. Powers and Reeve Elliott felt that the residents should be asked if they are willing to pay the costs, since lack of hydrants increases fire insurance costs. The motion to yank the hydrants was passed with a vote of 7 to 2 in favour.

Changes Mind, Constable Will Stay With Force
