Standard Products Earns \$1.02 Per Share is Report

The Standard Products Company, automotive parts and building products supplier, earned \$790,230 or \$1.02 a share for the nine months ended March 31st, 1964. This compared with \$882,500 or \$1.10 a share for the same nine months a year ago and was the Company's second best performance for this period since 1957. James S. Reid, Jr., president, said today in a letter to shareholders that net income for the three months ended March 31st was \$247,777 or 45 cents a share, compared with \$278,547 or 49 cents a share for the third quarter of the preceding year. Sales for the first nine months of the fiscal year were \$31,471,872, including about \$3,780,000 in military business. This compares with total sales of \$28,773,408 for the same period a year ago. Military backlog presently is \$1,750,000 including a recent order for M-14 personnel carrier band tracks.

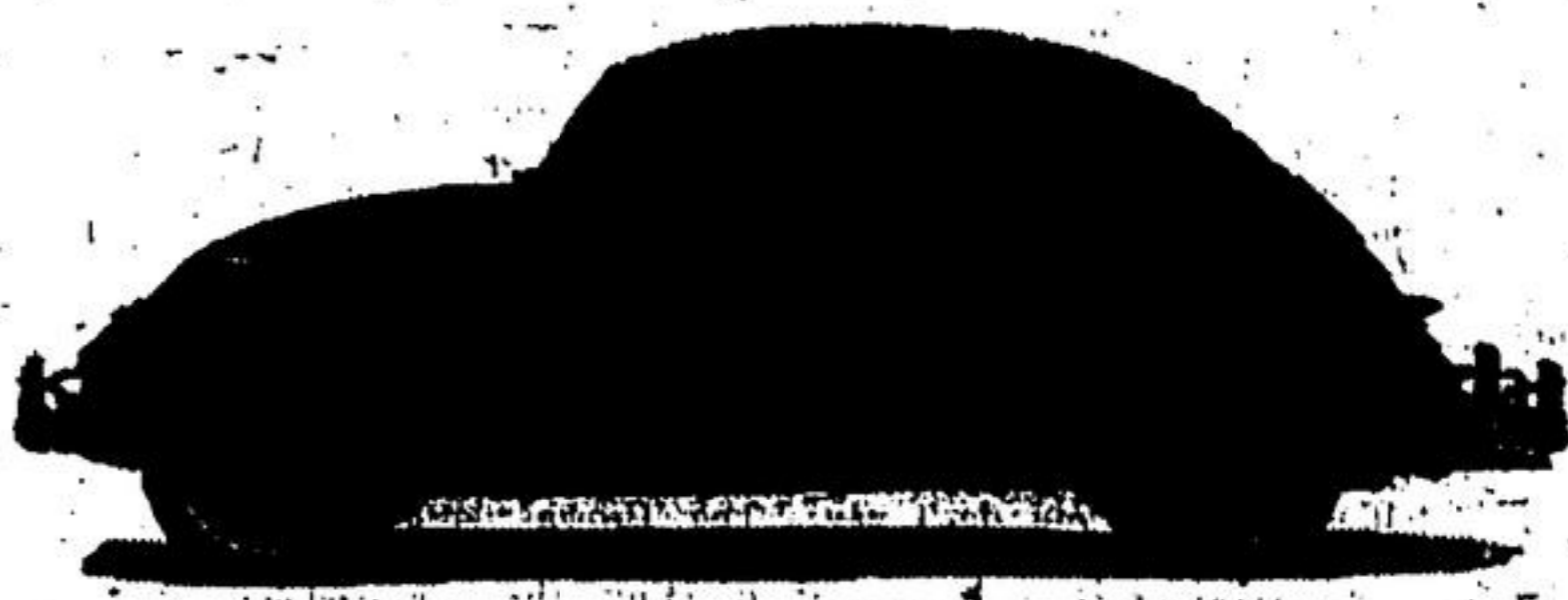
