### Gaming House Charge For Brampton Man

Georgetown and Norval men were among eighteen who appeared in Guelph court last week following a gambling raid on a Guelph hotel suite.

A Brampton man, who admitted keeping a gaming house in the suite, was fined \$500 and about \$200 seized at the dice game was ordered confiscated.

The Brampton man pleaded guilty to the charge but another Toronto man accused had his charge withdrawn by the Crown Attorney.

Yet other men who pleaded guilty to being found-ins were fined \$25. Seven other similarly charged were remanded one week for trial.

Cat David Mitchell of the OPP anti-gambling squad told of raiding the hotel suite with fellow police on March 12th.

The men in the room were from Georgetown, Norval, Erin, Orangeville, Grand Valley, Belwood, Brampton, Anglewood, Oakville and Snelgrove.

There was a pair of dice on the table, cards were strewn about, and a home-made 'bank crap layout' was in use.
