Maple Leaf Brass Like Spot Closer to Town

Toronto Maple Leafs of the International Baseball League may be playing their home games even closer to Georgetown than a Herald story two weeks ago first revealed.

Maple Leaf Ball Club brass looked over the Hornby station site, first mooted as the likely spot for a new three million dollar stadium last week, but they only had eyes for a site closer to Highway 401.

Maple Leaf officials expressed keen interest in the area just south of Hornby Station, but decided the property on

the 7th Line at Highway 401 about seven miles south of Georgetown, might be a better location.

A Trafalgar Parks Board official, William Bateman, said he plans to immediately begin making a survey of the lands around the 401-7th line area and will forward a complete report to the Toronto club as soon as possible.

It is expected Leafs officials will again tour the area once the report has been studied by them.

The proposed stadium would have a seating capacity of 20,000 persons and parking for 10,000.

Giant Manager Predicts Better Year in Baseball

Mike Lorusso, manager of the Georgetown Giants of the Halton Intermediate Baseball League watched his charges go through their first workout and then predicted a better fate for the club in 1964.

The team finished on the bottom of the league last season.

"We should make it to the middle of the standings this season," Lorusso told The Herald. "Not everyone I expected showed up at the first practice yesterday (Sunday), but I saw enough to be optimistic."

Lorusso said the club would be stronger at the plate and in the infield this year.

Approximately 20 ball players turned up for the Giant practice including three new tryouts.

The workout turned into a hitting practice as Lorusso paraded his players to the plate and put his outfielders to shagging fly balls.

The Giants start in Campbellville May 18 and open at home May 20.

On an adjoining diamond the Midget ball club worked on getting in shape at their first practice.

On-the-spot running and calisthenics dominated the workout which concluded with a game of pepper.

The Giants are practicing every night this week starting at 8:30 and the Midgets had their second practice last night (Wednesday).

Beavers Win 8-5 in Canuck Game Sunday

Georgetown Rigger Beavers added Canuck scalps to their belt Sunday defeating the hoosier club 8-5 in Georgetown park.

As expected the game was fast and rough from start to finish with playing surging from one end of the field to the other.

Four substitutes were included in the lineup that upset the Canucks, who up until Sunday hadn't tasted defeat.

A hard-tackling defense led by Sandy Mackenzie gave the visitors more than their share of trouble and was the major factor in Georgetown's win.

Brilliant sunshine brought out the largest crowd of the season and their presence appeared to inspire Beavers.

Canucks saw little of the Beaver end of the field in the early going and finally surrendered a score by Roger Newman Newman, who recently joined the Beavers displayed his old-country experience by threading his way through Canuck defenders all the way from the Beaver 25 yard. Len Judge punted the extra point to make it 5-0.

Moments later Gord Lee ran an end sweep into Canuck territory, booted the ball in field to Mark Hefron when he couldn't go deeper, and Hefron carried the ball to the goal line before flipping out. Trevor Sampson, trailing the play, took it across for three more points. The try for extra points was wide and Beavers won an 8-0 margin at half time.

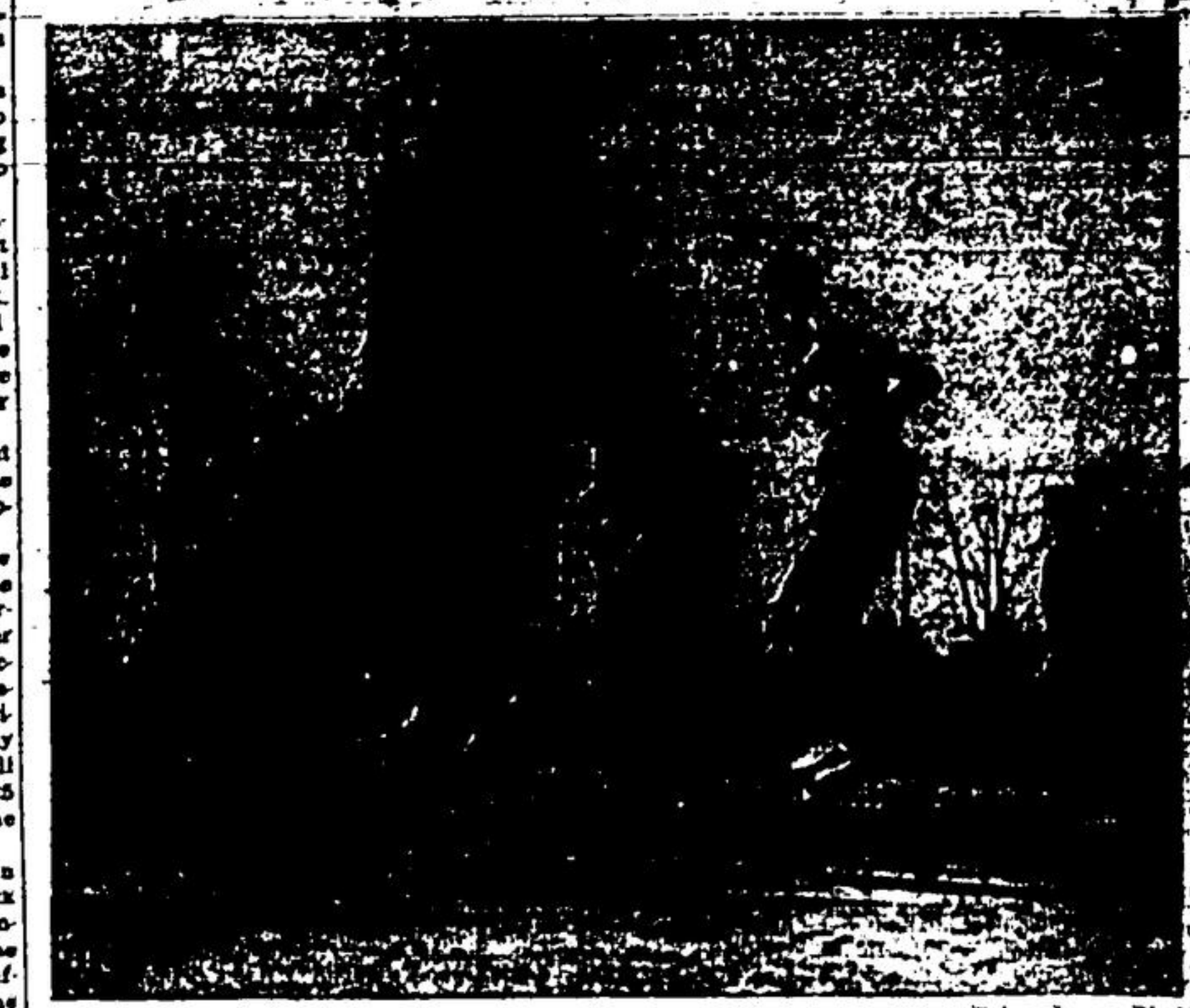
Sandy Mackenzie twice dropped a ball carrier within a few feet of the Beaver goal line as Canucks applied pressure early in the second half. Canucks finally charged down a kick and followed it up with a try by George Struthers. The conversion was good, making it 8-5.

Georgetown plays again on May 2nd, at Ajax.

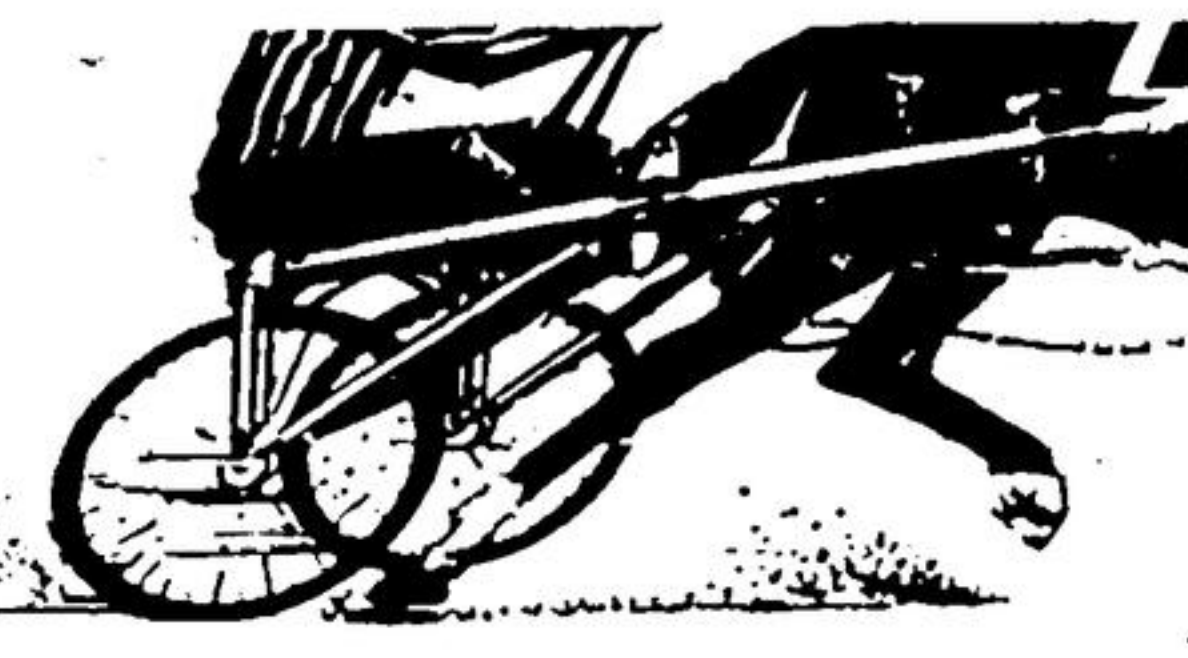
STRESS CONDITIONING
