Planned Private School

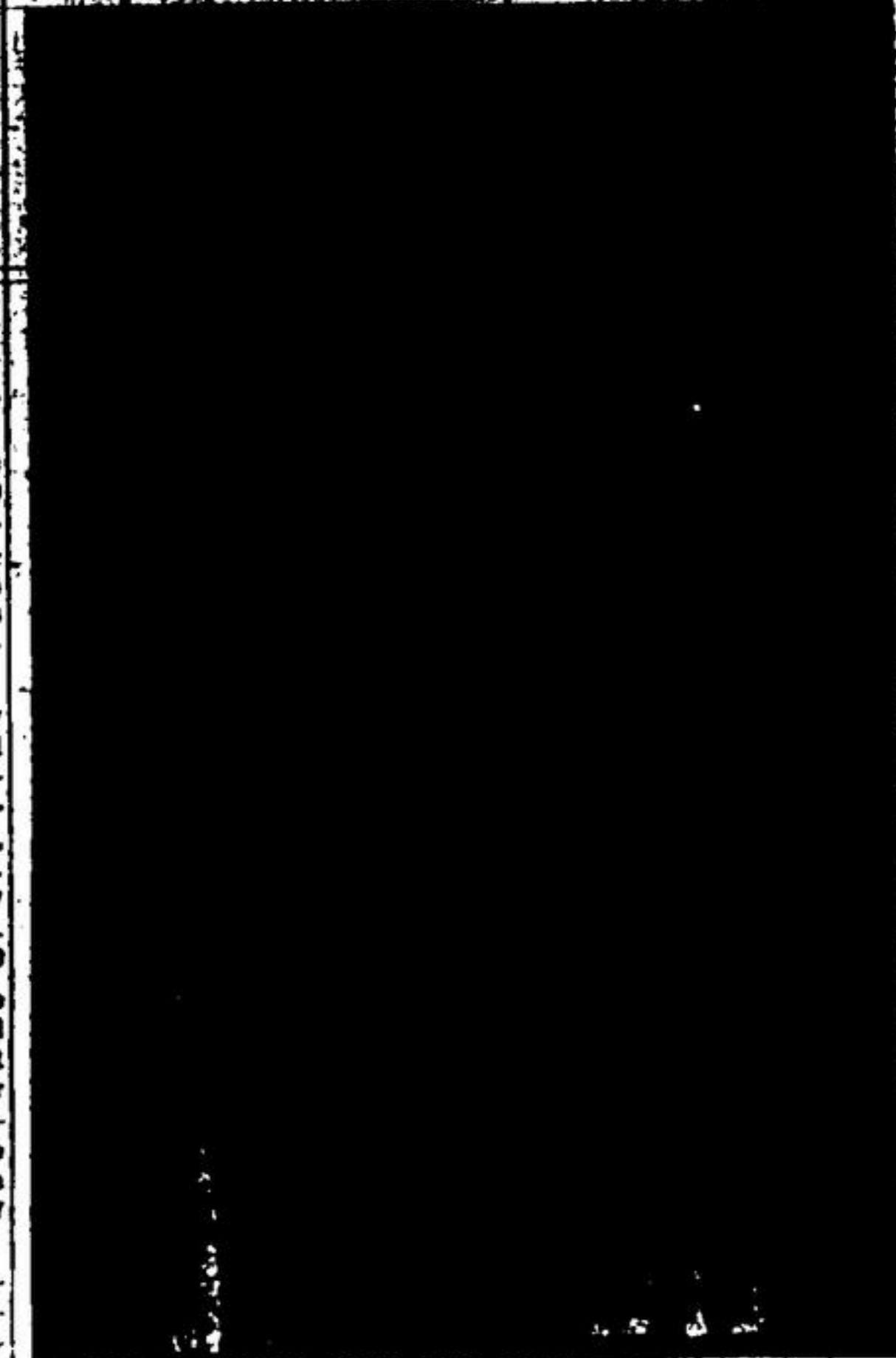

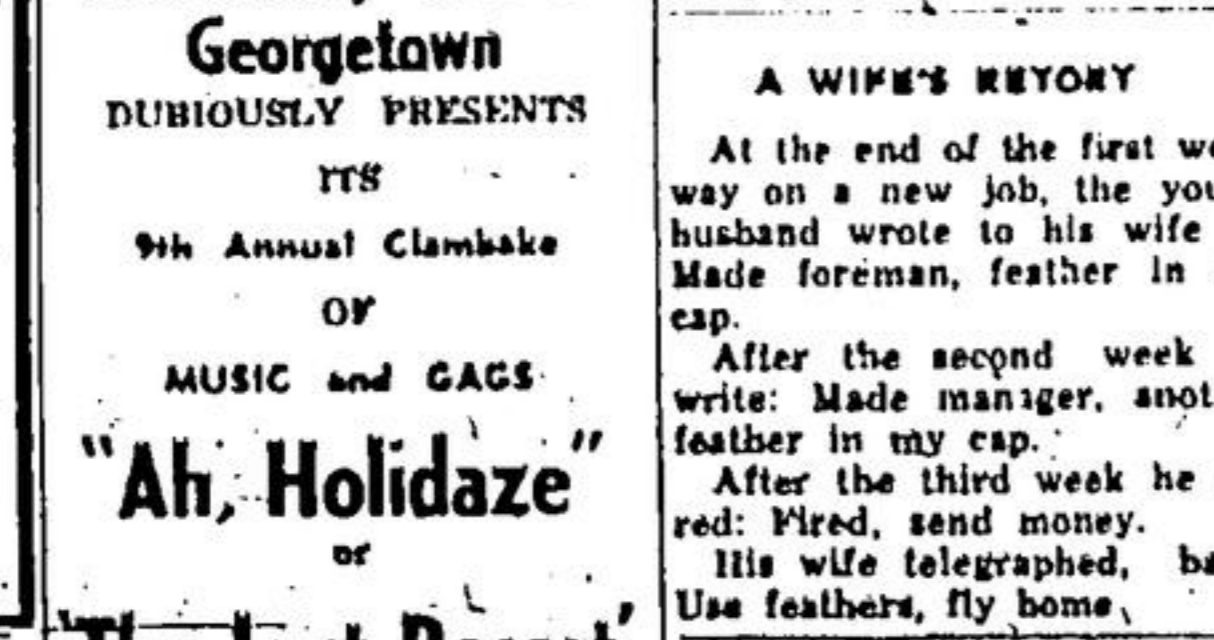
**A WIFE'S REPLY**
