Now Mayor's Turn

Georgetown is going through a difficult period in its history at present.

Not since cancellation of the Arrow contract and the dislocation of hundreds of our citizens, has the atmosphere been tinged with a beneral feeling of gloom and una rest. The reason, of course -- the strike of employees in Georgetown's largest industry, and a threatened strike at the Malton Orenda plant which would affect a couple of hundred local people as well

The impasse between Smith & Stone management and employees was intensified friday. Announcement that both parties would meet with the Minister of Labour had been greeted with optimism. And while no one was expecting an immediate end to the strike, it was hoped that this would be at least a springboard for talks to continue.


