Served Montreal Bank As Accountant Here

A former town resident, Kenneth L. Wilson, died recently at his home, 87 McTear Drive, Leaside.

While in Georgetown Mr. Wilson was accountant at the Bank of Montreal. The bank branch closed during the war and the building now houses the Royal Bank. He was a lay reader at St. George's Anglican church and a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Mr. Wilson was transferred from Georgetown to Toronto after his retirement from the bank he was associated with the St. John Ambulance in the city.

\$125,000 in Contracts To Varian Associates

A Georgetown firm, Varian Associates of Canada Ltd., has been awarded two contracts by the Department of Defence Production.

Hon. C. M. Drury announced here that the Georgetown firm will supply magnetrons to the value of \$129,600 and, in a second contract, magnetrons to the value of \$25,920.

The two contracts were among 239 unclassified defence contracts for \$10,000 or more awarded by the department during the latter half of March. Total value of the contracts is \$22,601,372.

Walt Dixon is in charge of publicity and a committee of Wayne Norton, Jim Lindsay and Wayne Compton are in charge of club activities.

Hospital Employee Served With Army In First World War

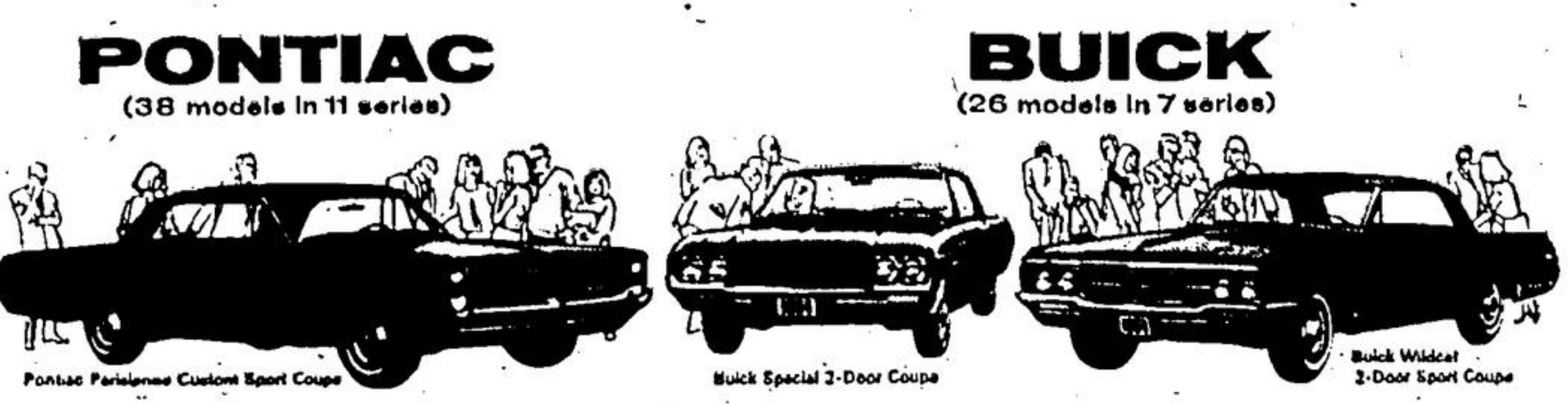
Funeral service took place last Wednesday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home for Percy Dillon, 67, who died in Georgetown Hospital on April 27th.

A native of St. Catharines, he was the son of Tom and Isabel (Harold) Dillon, and had spent most of his life in Georgetown.

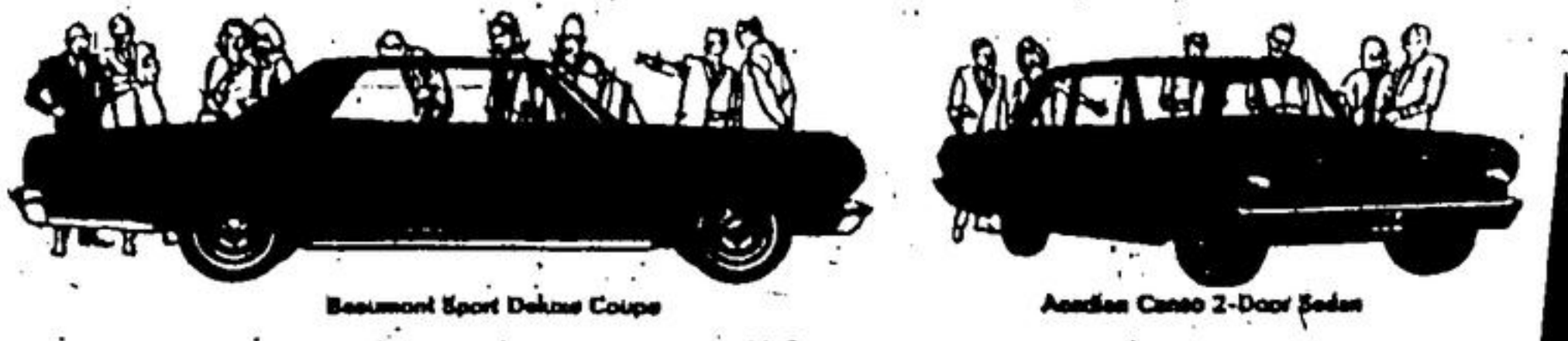
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
