Grand Garcon is trained by Wolfgang von Richthofen and housed at Wolfhill Farm, Haltonville.

"He just was not ready," said Carmen von Richthofen, daughter of the trainer after Grand Garcon ran sixth in the Derby trial Tuesday.

Grand Garcon was bought for \$10,000 at E. P. Taylor's annual pre-priced yearling sales two years ago and has been trained by the von Richthofens since then.

Miss von Richthofen said the horse will continue the season at Fort Erie.

Beavers Grab the Offer. Circus Slated for Arena

The International Hippodrome Circus will definitely make Georgetown stopover next week—but not through the sponsorship of the Georgetown Lions.

The Lions have dropped the project after considering it as a novel money-raiser.

Right there to shoulder the responsibility for putting the circus in the Memorial arena, May 16th as originally scheduled was The Beavers Junior B Hockey Club.

"We were offered the opportunity to sponsor the circus when the Lions turned it down so we grabbed it," said Beaver manager Walter "Red" Asseltine. "I'll be giving up a fishing trip to take it on, but if it puts money in the club treasury it'll be worth it."

Asseltine said it's probable Beaver players will assist with some of the work on circus day and greet the audience personally as ushers.

Two performances, one at 2 p.m. and another at 8, will feature elephants, a trained horse act, monkeys, doberman pinschers, high wire acts, clowns and just about everything associated with the big top.

Asseltine said the circus company will probably tent up outside the rear entrance to the arena and bring the acts on and off through the double doors.

The circus will be coming here direct from a Galt performance on the 14th. During its 18 days in Ontario it will stop at Cornwall May 4 and Chatham May 22-23.

It is expected advance sale of tickets for the Georgetown performance will start this week. Publicity people from the International Hippodrome's New York headquarters will be in town this week to start the advertising campaign.

39 Teams Make Record Entry in County Ball

The closing date for entries was April 27th, and a total of thirty-nine teams applied for entry for the 1964 season into Halton County Hamilton, Ancaster and Ferris, teams outside of Halton County jurisdiction, applied for entry with Ferris having to withdraw for failing to get clearance from Western counties.

The groupings were made up as follows: 3 tyke teams, 6 pee-wee teams, 9 bantam teams, 9 midget teams, 9 juvenile teams.

Schedules are now being drafted by league conveners and will be released to respective managers by the end of next week, to be studied. Any problems arising will be dealt with at an open meeting May 13, at 8 p.m. in the Milton Legion Hall.

The Minor executive voted on scrapping the split (north and south) league and home and home series will be played by all teams this year.

Schedules will start around May 18th and will end between July 18th and 31st. The teams will first conduct Halton County playoffs to be finalized by August 15th and then into group playoffs for O.B.A. competition to be finished on or around September 1st.

The final season of the umpires school will be held this Sunday at 12 noon at the Georgetown Arena.

George Baines has conducted this highly successful venture and with sixty applicants in attendance Halton County is looking forward to good umpiring this year.
