
and John Jolliffe of the Guelph Club.

Employment Office Says April Hirings Are Quite "Brisk"

Employment activity continued at a brisk pace throughout the month of April with jobs being found for 304 persons through the National Employment Service.

At the end of April there were 1248 persons registered for work at the Brampton Office, down 124 from the end of last month but the same as the number registered one year ago.

A considerable number of students have registered for summer work. Some, the university students, are available immediately and the high school students will be available in mid-June. The National Employment Office recommends these students to those employers who require extra help during the summer. A telephone call will bring prompt action on your request.
