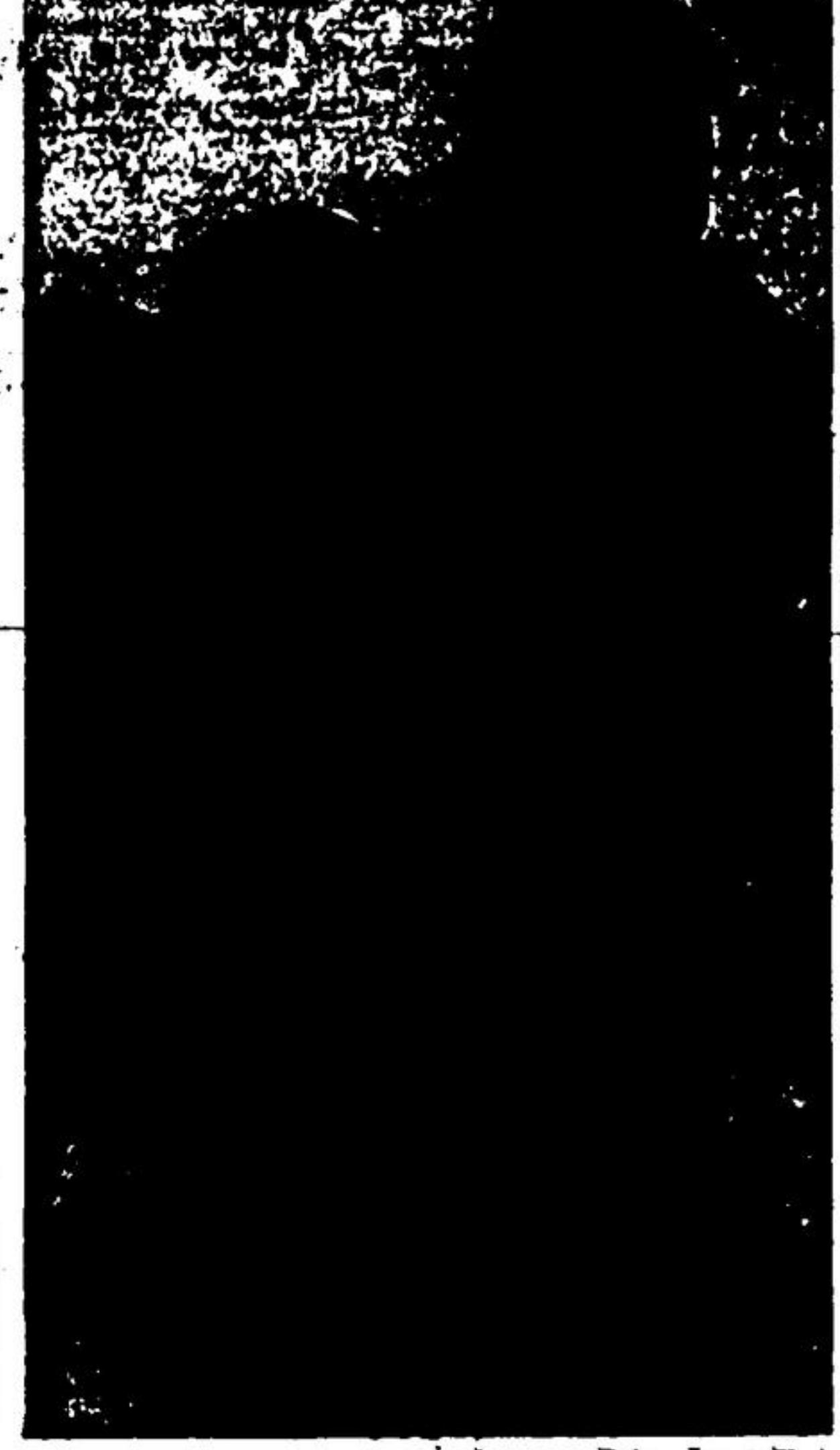
and John Jolliffe of the Guelph Club.
