Oral tests, graduation exercises and the presentation of diplomas on Friday afternoon closed a week-long regional fire school attended by seven Georgetown firefighters. It was conducted in three Oakville fire halls, by five instructors from the Ontario Fire Marshal's office, Toronto.

During five days and one evening of instruction, the men learned from the experts about such vital subjects as fire extinguishers, fire hydraulics, knots, salvage, ventilation, pumps, rescue work, masks, ladders, pumping, forcible entry, hose loads and fittings, nozzles, radio communications, and special hazards.

In a practical demonstration on Friday morning, the men assembled at the King Paving Dock on Oakville's waterfront to extinguish a roaring oil and gas fire with water fog sprayed on the blaze from a nearby pumper. The fire was prepared and deliberately set by VMO instructor, who ignited a 30 square foot pit filled with 1,500 gallons of gasoline. Straight hose streams of water failed to have any effect on the fire, but the fog nozzles produced a blanket of water which smothered the flames and cut off the oxygen supply.

District Instructor William O'Sullivan of the VMO was in charge of the course, assisted by instructors Robert Stewart, A. Anderson, Thomas Jarvis and Herb Mallory. Courses were held in Oakville's Rebecca St. and No. 2 Fire Stations and the Fire Department Headquarters on Church St. Oakville Deputy Reeve Lester Whiting, County Mutual Aid Co-ordinator, Chief Douglas Wilson of Oakville, Deputy Co-ordinator Chief A. E. Clement of Milton and Oakville District Chief Grant Bray at-

tended the closing ceremony, and assisted in the presentation of diplomas to the successful firefighters.

Each speaker praised the volunteers for taking time off from work to become better trained for their jobs in their respective fire departments. Mr. O'Sullivan said a great deal of praise was due the employers of firefighters attending the school, for granting a leave of absence for the men to attend. He said the men would be more valuable to their place of employment and to their communities, after the valuable training the school provided.

Firefighters from Oakville, Burlington, Ayrton, Georgetown and Milton fire departments, as well as several industrial fire department representatives, attended the school. Georgetown fire brigade representatives attending included Deputy Chief Will Breen, Bill Hillier, Harold Bennett, Gordon Inglis, Art Stamp and Art Balley. Dick Packer of Provincial Paper Mills industrial brigade also attended.

Warns Garbage Offenders to Cooperate or Be Fined

Leveling a blast at residents who do not use proper garbage containers, Cr. Bill Smith was supported by council Monday in a plan to advertise regulations and lay charges against those who do not cooperate.

"There was more garbage blowing around the street on Saturday than there was at the town dump" said Cr. Smith angrily. "It's time residents realize they must cooperate and help keep our town tidy."
