

Infielders Can't Find Handle Giants Hand Easy Win to Sox

A hard-hitting Milton Red Sox club got unexpected help from a sleepy Georgetown Giants infield to coast to a 16-5 victory in an exhibition inter-league ball game here Sunday afternoon.

The Sox tracked up a dozen hits and capitalized on five infield errors to roll to the decisive victory.

The Milton win was partially due to fine pitching displays turned in by Merv Fisher, and Ken Taylor.

Giants were unable to get a ball out of the infield as Taylor, a Sox rookie, faced the minimum six batters in the first two innings of the game. Three of the Giants facing the youngsters struck out and all other three were caught on infield ground balls.

Fisher was victimized by a pair of misplaying errors and he yielded an unearned run in the sixth when he misplayed the ball to a two-inning start, fanned two, walked two and hit one batsman.

Most successful of the Milton batsmen were the Currie brothers, Don and Bill. Bill, playing at second and short, came up with a triple and a single in six trips to the plate.

Don rapped out three singles and a homer in six trips but had difficulty adjusting to third base. Usually an outfielder, the 215-pound youngster made a pair of costly throwing errors.

Rookie left fielder Johnny Zoppas was another effect. Sox chatted at the plate as he tripled and singled in four trips.

Milton eventually got to even, although Bernie Dore pitched well for four innings. The veteran was touched for three runs but gave up just three hits, as he was hurt badly by the defensive play.

Roger Cummins, Jim Lindsay and Glen Gibbs failed to hold the Sox in pitching stints for the losers. It took all three to weather a six-run eighth inning.

Other Milton pitcher was Wayne Hillson. Hillson also looked ready as he yielded two and walked one.

Giants had less difficulty with Brian McDuffa than any of the other Milton hurlers. They touched the fireballing youngster for two doubles, three singles and three runs in the last three innings. He walked three and struck out two.

Tracy Barrager, who umpired the game behind the plate, tossed Milton shortstop Glen Dames out of the game in the eighth.

Dames complained after the game he had been tossed out for remarks not even directed at the umpire after a strike call.

Giants play in Campbellville Monday and open here Wednesday.
