

# Young Adults Lead Manor Service—Ask "What Is God Like?"

A very interesting sermon by Rev. J. L. Graham and a fine baritone solo by Mr. J. Clements contributed greatly to the church service in the chapel on Sunday afternoon, April 28th. The solo was a beautiful setting of one of the psalms, "The Earth is the Lord's." Mrs. K. O. Foster played the organ accompaniment for the solo and for the hymns.

After having read the Parable of the Good Samaritan, Mr. Graham described the three philosophies exemplified by the actions of the characters in this parable. The philosophy of the thieves may be summed up in the words: "What's yours is mine and I'll take it; that of the priest and the Levite in the words: "What's mine is mine and I'll keep it; that of the Good Samaritan in the words: "What is mine is God's and I'll share it." Mr. Graham described how these philosophies can be seen in action in modern living and how the Samaritan's philosophy can be exemplified in modern Christian lives.

An evening church service was held in the chapel on April 28th when the Young Adult Group of St. Paul's Church in Long Branch came to present this service. Mr. Arnold Stewart was in charge of the service. Mrs. Joyce Hutchinson played the organ and Mr. D. Plewes led the singing. Mr. Stewart began his address by saying that a very profound question can be asked in the words "What is God like?" There have been many answers to this question. For example, Moses looked upon God as law, Solomon as wisdom and Isaiah as righteousness. Revelation gives the most wonderful answer of all: "God is love."

Mr. Stewart described the beautiful painting that portrays Christ as standing at a door and knocking and comparing this painting to Christ's knocking at the door of the human heart.

After the address, a number of familiar hymns were sung with Mr. Plewes as leader.

A particularly lovely song in this group was Give Me Oil For My Lamp.
