Slight 1963 Deficit But Township in Good Shape

A slight deficit on the 1963 accounts was reported in the Township of Georgetown. Auditor's report, released recently, showed a deficit of \$2,000.00. The deficit was the result of a \$200,000.00 loan which was deducted from the surplus carried forward from prior years and this surplus was \$200,000.00.

Worship Yards

The report called attention to the worship yards which were valued at \$200,000.00, representing a total of 30 per cent of the current year's budget.

"In our opinion, this is a substantially dangerous situation and should be a matter of concern."

A determined effort should be made to reduce these unpaid taxes," the report continued.

Not Paid Over

The auditor also reported the share of supplementary tax was not paid over to the schools and county by December 31st as is required by regulations.

Total revenue for the township during the year \$506,746.00 with total expenditures at \$508,788.02. Of these amounts \$200,000.00, including debt charges accounted for expenditures of \$300,788.02. Paid to the county on the county rate was \$20,155.02.

The common interests of the groups are listed as hunting, fishing, conservation, trespassing and hiking.

The association recognizes and holds in high esteem the rights and privileges of the residents and landowners of the British Columbia, the release states.

It also says the members of the six active sportsmen's groups in British Columbia who work up the association feel that through unfavorable and uncontrolled publicity or undue pressure, heavy legislation could be enacted that might better be handled through equal representation of all parties and organizations involved.
