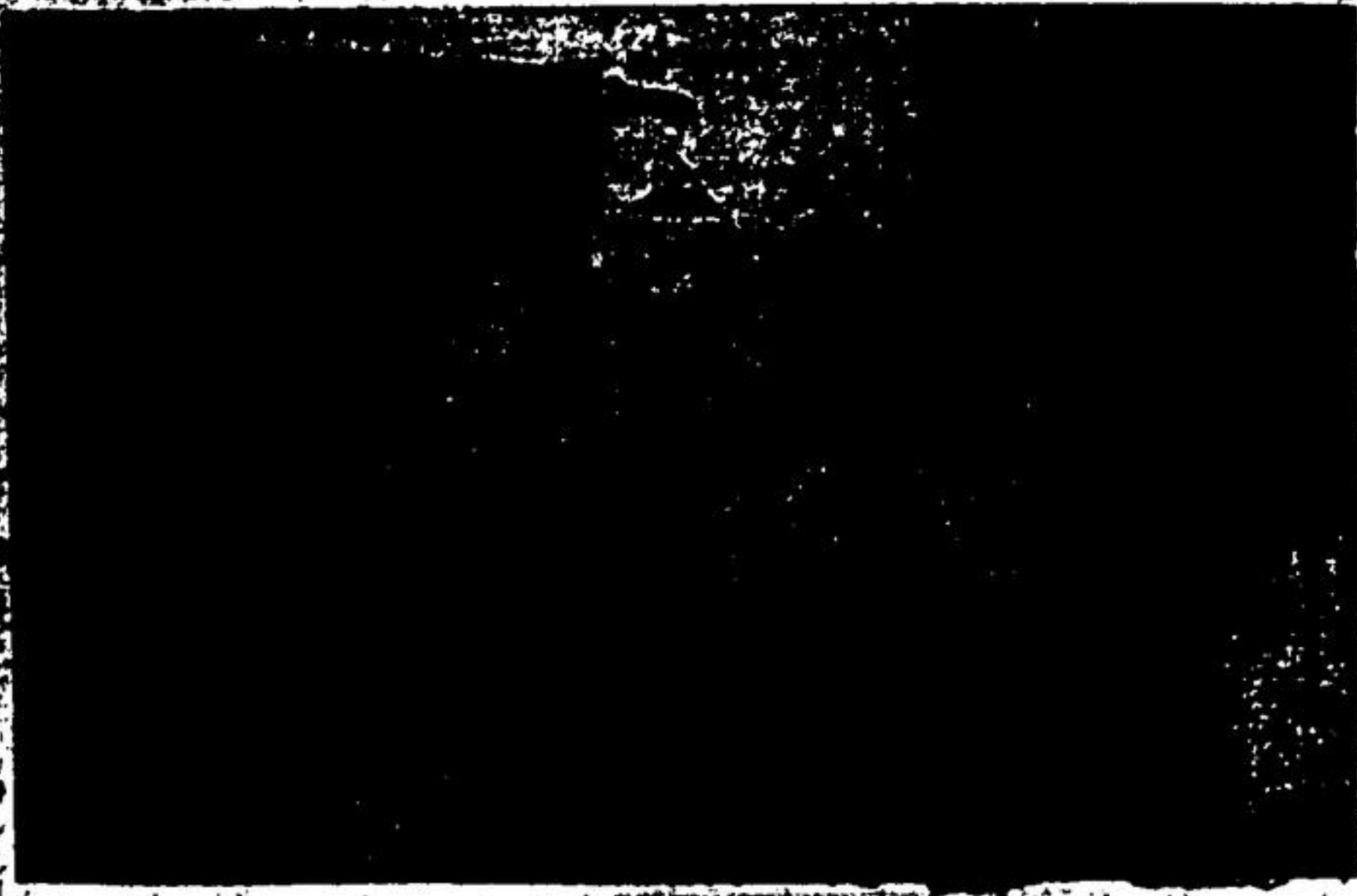

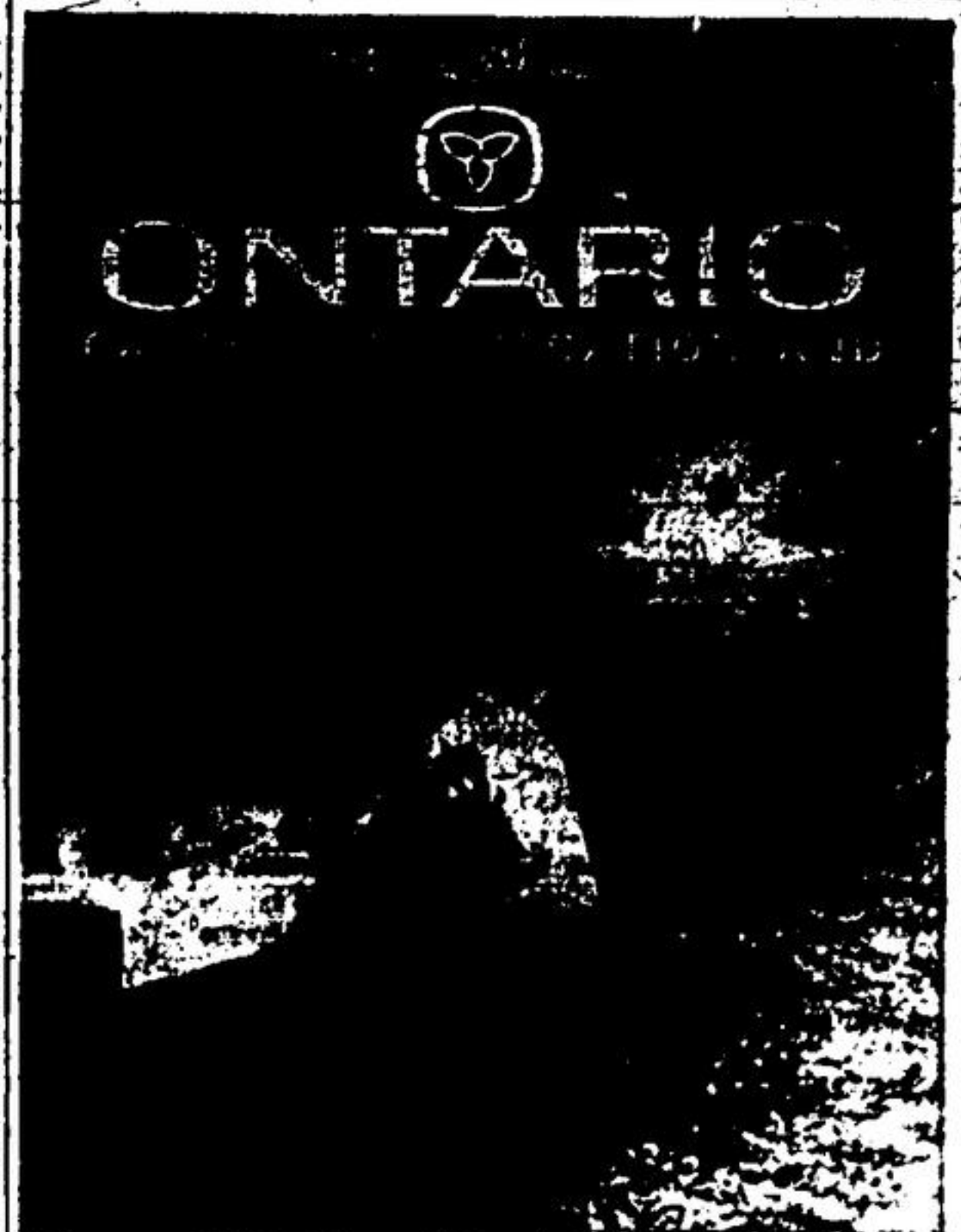

If local Georgetown names appear in lights at the Great Theatre or Stratford, a few years hence, it will be due largely to the efforts of Mike Peleschak, local high school teacher, who has reawakened a dying interest in drama, and turned the High School Drama Club into the largest, most active club in the school.

Almost any time after school, the hammering of flats being constructed, can be heard as at least some of the fifty members create and design the sets with the guidance of Mr. Peleschak, who firmly believes in the old adage of learning by doing.

With nine productions under their belt in the last four years, the club is gradually accumulating a store of props and costumes.

From the proceeds of the last sellout production — 'Showcase '64', they plan to buy portable lights and storage cupboards.

Even the parent who may think this sounds a little frivolous will be reconciled when he learns the plays are frequently coordinated with the study courses in literature, and an added interest and awareness of the subject is the result.

But what about the man behind all this activity? In Criminsty and London he began with his parts in high school productions just as the students he is now coaching are doing. Here musicals and dramas were the order of the day, but later at Western University as a member of the Players Guild he took part in avant-garde productions, and even tackled Oedipus Rex.

During his brief army career, he helped stage camp entertainment at Camp Borden and Camp Ipperwash. As past members of the London Little Theatre, both Mike and Mary Peleschak joined the Georgetown Little Theatre as soon as it was formed, and have been active members ever since.

Mr. Peleschak is particularly pleased that other teachers are now becoming interested, and now has the help of Miss Joan Bowers, and Mrs. Anne Loney.

He is proud of his kids' saying 'they are so well organized this last year they took over the sale of \$4,000 worth of textbooks on one hour's notice, and the profits went to the Drama Club.'

The eyes of Canadian Holstein breeders will be turned towards Southern Ontario and Georgetown in particular for the next two weeks where a series of important sales will be held that could well set a pattern of prices for the balance of the year.

The ten major sales which will go on from now until June 4, include two at the Georgetown Sales Arena on the 7th line of Esqueping just north of the Esqueping municipal building.

On May 22 (tomorrow) the Dr. Russell Osborne Dispersal Sale will be held at the Georgetown sales arena, and on the following Friday, May 29th, it will be the Rockwood Consignment in the sale arena.

Buyers from many countries are expected to attend these sales including USA, France, Italy, Great Britain, Argentina, Chile, Peru, Ecuador, Colombia, Venezuela, Mexico and Jamaica.

The other major sales will be at Glasworth, Waterloo, Unionville, Bridgeport and Oakville.

The delegates of the Oakville and District Labour Council at last night's monthly meeting complied with a request of the Education Dept. of the Canadian Labour Congress to send Executive Officers of the Oakville Council and other Ontario Labour Councils to a Weekend Seminar at Port Elgin, Ontario, to be held on June 26, 1964, through June 28, 1964.

Among the guest speakers at the Weekend affair is Mr. M. Sverdlow, Registrar of the Canadian Labour College and Educational Director of the Canadian Labour Congress. Several Labour Council officers have indicated interest and will participate. The seminar will be held at the UAW Education Centre at Port Elgin.

A further donation was made to local 183 of the Toronto Laundry Union where 400 members are engaged in a strike in the construction industry.

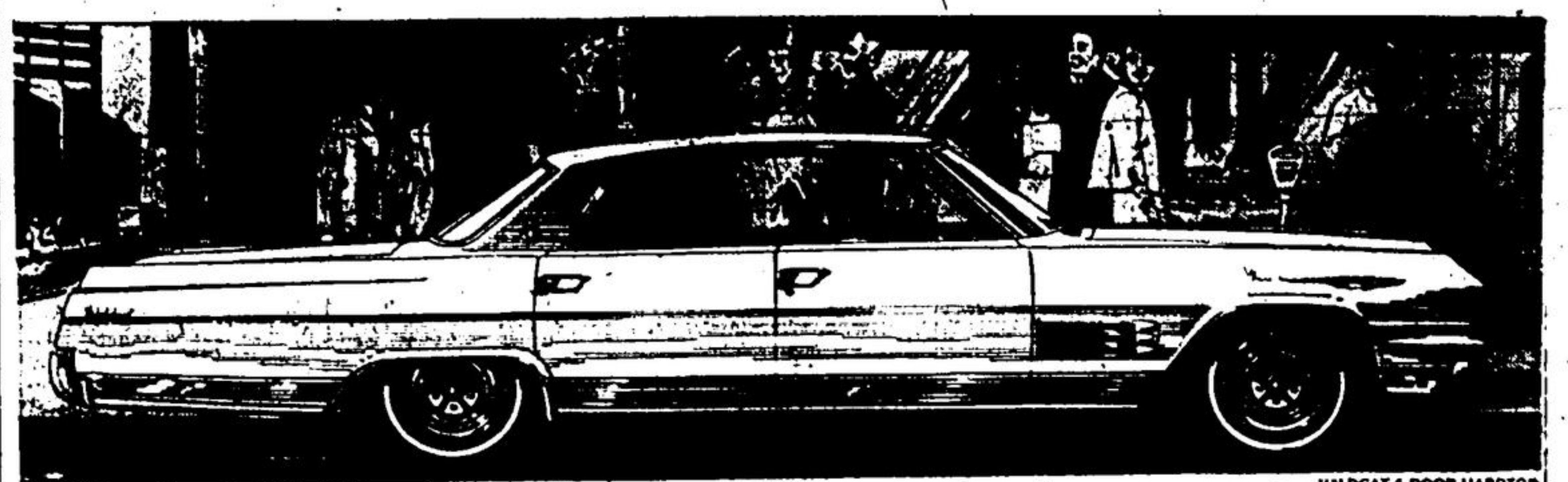

A newspaper carried this social note recently. Frank Cape is in the general hospital suffering from head injuries and shock caused by coming in contact with a live wire.



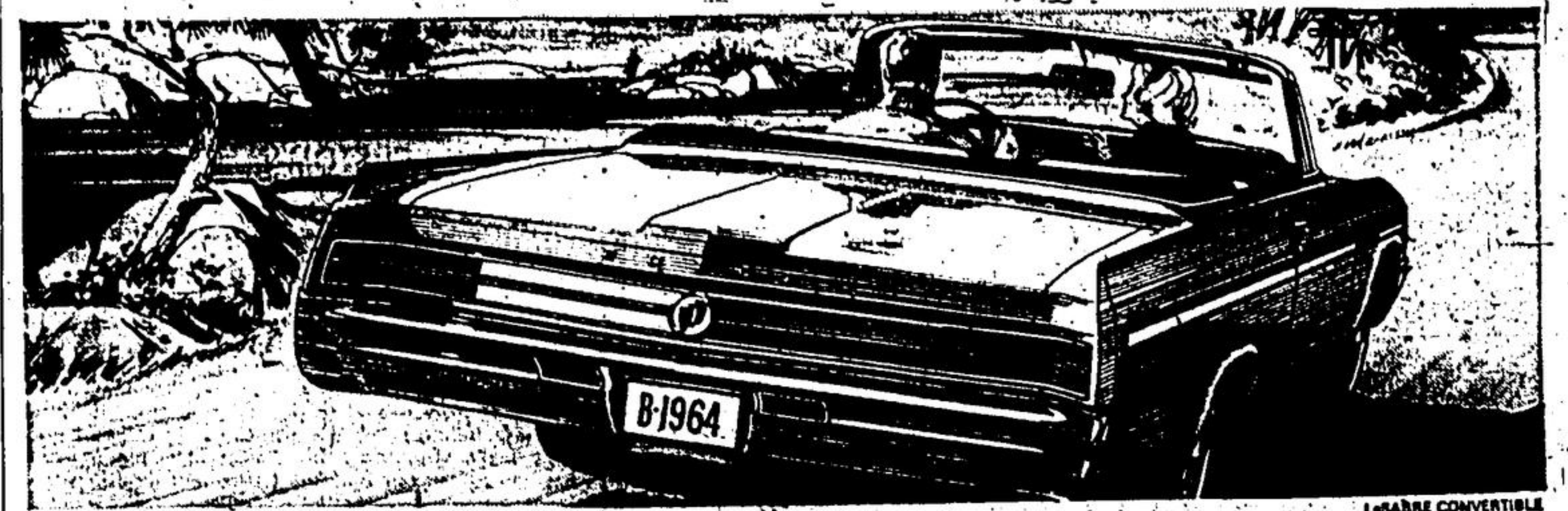

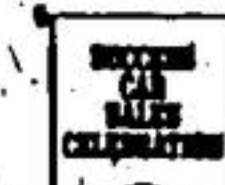
