POOR BOY SANDWICHES ON PARADE

When or where they originated is still in dispute, but on warm summer days the chief cook welcomes them every one! Eat them in the hand or with knife and fork — a complete meal with no fuss! They can be imaginatively simple or noble 'etable' 'edifices.

GRINDERS

Serve hot or cold
6 Poor Boy rolls
Half pound hard Cervelat, (thinly sliced, 36 slices)
Yield: 6 Grinders
18 slices tomato
12 thin slices sweet Bermuda onion
12 thin sharp processed cheese
METHOD: Cut each roll in half, lengthwise. On each bottom half of rolls, place 6 slices Cervelat, 3 slices tomato, 2 slices onion (broken into rings) and 2 slices cheese. Replace roll tops. Place on baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (400 d. F.) for about 5 minutes, or until cheese softens.

POOR BOY SANDWICH

1 tablespoon vinegar
2 tablespoons salad oil
Cruddy French stick — sliced in half-lengthwise
4 (1-oz.) slices smoked ham
Yield: 4 Poor Boy Sandwiches
12 thin slices cucumber
4 (1-oz.) slices Cheddar cheese
8 thin slices tomato
METHOD: Combine vinegar and salad oil; brush on cut surfaces of bread. On bottom half, place ham slices, slices of cucumber, slices of cheese (cut in half) and slices of tomato. Place top half of bread over all. Cut into four pieces.

DAGWOOD SANDWICHES

4 sliced wiener buns
1 tablespoon French dressing
8 slices Cheddar cheese (cut in half, diagonally)
1 tomato, thinly sliced
Yield: 4 Dagwood Sandwiches
4 (1-oz.) slices bologna
1 small carrot (cut in 4 lengthwise slices)
Half cup chopped lettuce
METHOD: Slice each bun in half, lengthwise; brush cut sides with French dressing. Place 4 triangle slices of cheese across bottom half of each bun. Cut tomato slices and bologna in half. Top cheese with 3 tomato slices, halved, 2 bologna pieces, 1 slice carrot and 2 tablespoons chopped lettuce. Cover with bun tops. Secure sandwiches with toothpicks.

HERO SANDWICH

6 brown 'n serve hard rolls
¼ cup French dressing
1 teaspoon dill seeds
6 slices Cheddar cheese, (cut in half)
Yield: 6 Hero Sandwiches
6 tablespoons chopped black olives
½ oz. salami, about 18 thin slices
12 slices bread and butter-pickled
18 strips pimiento
METHOD: Cut each roll in half, lengthwise and place, cut side up, on a cookie sheet. Brown in a hot oven (400 d. F.) for twelve minutes. Combine French dressing and dill seeds; brush on cut sides of rolls. On each bottom half of rolls, place 3 half slices of cheese, top with a tablespoon chopped olives, 3 salami slices, 2 bread and butter pickles and 3 pimiento strips; cover with top half

Cadet Corps Inspected

Brothers Judged 'Best' Cadets Rain Forces Troops Inside

Cadet Major Larry Stief won the Col. J. R. Barber trophy for Best Cadet for the second consecutive year at the inspection of the Georgetown High School Cadet Corps Tuesday, May 12.

Rain which perennially creates hurried switches in the inspection program soaked the parade area at the park again this year. The actual inspection of the ranks and march past was outdoors but field demonstrations had to be moved inside because of the ground conditions.

Major Earl Lince of Lorne Scots C Company was the inspecting officer replacing Lorne Scots Lt. Col. E. F. Coover, who couldn't attend. Also in the inspecting party was Lt. J. R. Cumming, C.D., Oakville H.Q. Central Command.

No. 1 Platoon under Lt. R. Hiddleston was judged best platoon on parade and earned the Major Lince Trophy.

Lt. Hiddleston also won the General Proficiency Award (No. 2), G. P. Award (No. 3) was won by Captain M. Baker.

Not to be outdone by his brother, Cpl. Dennis Stief was named Best First Year Boy, with Cpl. N. Hamilton receiving honourable mention. Best Girl Cadet was Sgt. E. Roberts with honourable mention to Cpl. B. Gosling.
