

Scot Delegate John Duncan May Get Red Carpet Here

County Board of the Halton Junior Farmers was held on May 8th in the Board Room of the Agricultural Office in Milton.

In addition to representatives from each of the four Junior Farmer Clubs in Halton, there was in attendance, Mrs. K. Coan, Home Economist for the Counties of Halton and Peel, the newly appointed Agricultural Representative for these counties, Mr. Henry Stanley, and his summer assistant, Mr. Bruce Huff from Prince Edward County.

President, Joy Hayward, began the session by expressing her thanks to each of the Juniors who took part in the Church Service held recently. Collection from this service will be divided equally between the Church and the Crippled Children's campaign.

The local county field day is to be held on June 20th, with the place undetermined as yet. A committee consisting of Tom Hunter, Marion Hunter, Allan Hayward and Lillian Finnie was chosen to decide where it is to be held and to draw up a schedule for the day. Entries for the events are to be brought to the next county board meeting.

Winners at the county field day may compete in 9 team events and 9 track and field events at the Guelph Field Day, to be held at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, on July 11th. Each Junior Farmer member is limited to one entry in the team events and one in the track and field events.

Halton County may have the pleasure of playing host to a Scottish delegate, John Duncan, from May 29th to June 12th. In the event that this materializes, a Social Night is to be planned in his honour, to be held June 5th. The committee to plan this event is made up of Graham Reeve, Ed Segsworth, Mr. Henry Stanley and Marilyn Wrigglesworth.

The forming of a club interested in debating and public speaking, was suggested at the last meeting. It was decided that since there is so much activity in the summer months, plans to start this club would be postponed until September.

Another new idea suggested last month was an exchange with a neighbouring county, of approximately 40 to 50 members for one week-end, with a return exchange also made. This would enable the Juniors to learn about other counties, of meeting other Junior Farmer members, and of having a jolly good time. Unfortunately, since there was not the required number interested in this exchange, the idea was dropped for another year.

A County competition in rifle shooting is to be held June 25th at Ashgrove Welding. Each Club may enter a team of four members, with everyone supplying their own ammunition.

The Provincial Junior Farmers are starting another freedom from hunger Campaign. Any donations from the four Clubs are to be in to County Board by September 1st. They will have four months in which to raise money for this Campaign.

Provincial Junior Farmer Camp will be held September 7 to 14 at Geneva Park at Lake Couchiching, Halton County.

Blames Corrupt Politics For Quebec, "Won't Secede"

Dispelling the thought that Quebec would secede from Confederation, Lucien Robichaud blamed present troubles on corrupt politics when he spoke to the Chamber of Commerce last week.

Mr. Robichaud, a local businessman who operates Delrex Smoke Shop with his brother-in-law, said the province of which he is a native has been

victim of the most corrupt politics in world history for the past twenty years.

"Only tonight we read in the paper that a minister of the old Duplessis government has been convicted of bribery," he said. "The province has been held back by unscrupulous politicians and has been a slave state. It has been set back a whole generation."

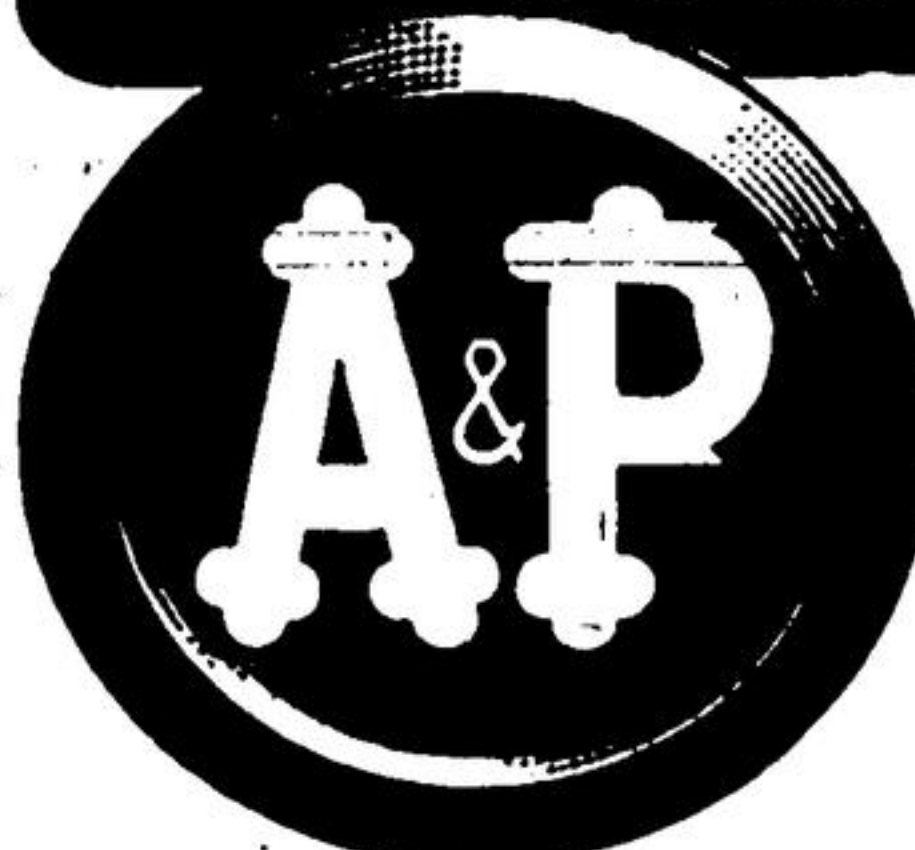
He said corruption had existed in every phase of public life, including municipal councils and school boards under the Duplessis regime.
