

## PCs Set Nomination Date Town Man In "Best's 12"

Halton County Conservatives have announced they are ready to squarely face the task of selecting a new federal candidate to contest the riding in the event of a 'snap' election.

Gordon Beatty, president of the Halton County Conservative Association, announced in a press release late last week that a convention to choose a federal candidate for Halton would be held October 29 in Milton.

The decision was made at a recent meeting of the Executive Committee of the Association, he said.

The PCs have also decided to hold a gathering of Young Progressive Conservatives the end of this month to whip up new interest among the YPCs.

Last week a former Halton MP, Dr. Alexander 'Sandy' Best called upon one of 12 followers of Conservatism to come forward and lead the party back to power in the riding.

If no one can be found to accept the nomination come October, Best said he will again make himself available as number 13.

Indications are that that possibility is becoming a probability as one by one the twelve listed by Best have publicly declined to seek the nomination.

Named by Best as 'possible PC candidates' were:

ACTON Halton riding PC president Gordon Beatty.

GEORGETOWN: Leslie Clark.

Milton Dr. John Brown.

OAKVILLE: Mayor Allan Mason, Kelly New, Tom Sale.

John Dewar and Glen Cooper.

BURLINGTON: William Hourigan, Ted Okulowski, Andrew Frame and Roy Coulter.

The only Georgetown man on the list, Les Clark, a former president of the Halton County Conservative Association, and one-time Canadian Legion zone commander said he has no intentions of letting his name stand for the nomination.

"I am sure," he said, "the Halton Conservatives will have a very, very active campaign leading up to their nomination meeting."

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exciting few months and I am sure we can expect to see other good men come forward and offer to stand for the nomination. For instance, not mentioned on that list are such names as Carl Martin, (Dr. C. A. Martin), Milton, Bill Thompson of Oakville, Bill Davidson, Burlington and Roy Coulter, North Burlington, and many, many other top-flight types in the county's political, and business life."

Clark noted that the Conservative nomination meeting to select a provincial candidate was one of the most active political affairs in the county's history.

Of the twelve named by Best, only Halton YPC president Andrew Frame of Burlington indicated any early interest.

After naming his twelve Best said: In view of the uncertain situation in Ottawa, Halton riding ought to have a candidate in the field and working."

"The names I have put forth are only those of fellow Conservatives I feel could do much to bring the party back into power. I myself will stand for the nomination if those I have picked are not interested; or if it appears those seeking the nomination are not suited to the task of electioneering."
