A telephone check of growers and nurseries in the Georgetown area revealed that fruit trees, shrubs and plants weathered the light frost without harm. At Dominion Seed House a spokesman said, "Everything here is of a nature that a little frost does no damage, so everything was okay Thursday morning."

Braunberger (English and Science), Miss W. Cuddy (Commercial), George Bechtel (History).

The seniors were given a talk on Tree Diseases and Insects, by District Forester Jack Brown, from Hespeler. The Club will have their final meeting on Wednesday, June 24th. They also have a Field Day scheduled for Monday, June 29th. The Forestry Club will finish its program for this year, on Wednesday, July 8. Their Achievement Day is held in conjunction with the Halton County Land Judging Competition.

### 102 Last Christmas Day Thomas Ross Dies in Toronto

A man whose birthday on Christmas day became feature news in the Toronto press, Thomas Ross died on May 18. Mr. Ross had reached the venerable age of 102 last year. He was blessed with good health until the last. His granddaughter, Mrs. C. V. Waldorf, 22 Elizabeth St., had dinner with him that day at his home in the city. He went to bed that night and died peacefully in his sleep. A native of Bruce County in the Lucknow district, he joined the Toronto police force in 1890 and served until his retirement in 1924. He had been founder and pipe major of three kilt bands—White Heather, the Toronto Police and Kilwinning Masonic Lodge bands. He had been a member of Parkdale Presbyterian Church for 85 years and the 100th birthday party tendered him at the church is still a highlight in the church's history.
