Looking like an organized log jam are those 700 picnic tables at Terra Cotta Conservation area. The tables were stacked near the park entrance after the park works staff refinished each with varnish in preparation for the annual tide of picnickers. Each sits 6 which figures to a seating capacity of 4,200. Refinishing all the tables was just one of the jobs that kept the park staff hopping in the weeks prior to opening day. Constructing a new shelter in the overnight camp area, cleaning up the leaves, draining the swimming area, washing it down and refilling it, and general sprucing up kept the work staff busy. Some of the preparatory work was done last fall. The park is operated by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. Its 300 acres includes four stocked fish ponds as well as the swimming area which is patrolled by 5 life guards.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

In spite of the holiday and the beautiful weather, the Action Bridge Club met as usual last Monday night. Twelve keen bridge players were present and just to show how far people will come for a bridge game, I will list where they were from. There were four from Georgetown, three from Action, two from Brampton, two from Toronto and one from Campbellville.

Although the action was furious as usual, there were not too many hands that contained instructive points. One hand, however, did catch my attention. It brings up an old point. If you are going to try and get away with something, then do it early.

This is Board No. 3. East West are vulnerable and the dealer was North.

West opens the diamond jack — correct from the sequence J 10 9 and East wins. A low diamond from East and South wins with the queen. There are three spade tricks more if they break. Three hearts, two diamonds and three clubs — a total of 11. But before these are claimed, South must lose the lead twice and the opponents will establish their diamonds.

What I suggest is that one trick must be stolen before the opponents get together. If South leads a low club, most Wests will duck. Now, with one club trick in, declarer can establish the heart suit. West wins the heart ace and knocks out South's last diamond, but declarer is home with three spades, three hearts, two diamonds and a stolen club.

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I imagine that some of you are wondering why I don't suggest that the hand be played in hearts. Actually, as it is, four hearts can be made, but when my partner and I defended, it was not I led the diamond jack. East won and returned a diamond. Declarer led a heart to dummy's 10, and a heart back. I won and led a third diamond — dummy ruffed but East over-ruffed. A club lead now set the contract. South was careless, of course, in playing hearts towards dummy. A high heart should be led from South's hand and now the 10 of hearts in dummy cannot be over-ruffed.

Herald Staffer's Father Was Lawyer, Newspaperman

A former lawyer and newspaperman, Fred Clarke Hastings, 60 died suddenly at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto on May 15 following a heart attack. His son David is a member of the Herald staff.

Mr. Hastings was born in Hamilton, graduated in law from Osgoode Hall and practiced in Dunnville. He later entered the newspaper business with his father, David Hastings, who published the Dunnville Gazette. The business was later sold to another Dunnville publication, the Chronicle which is now owned by Thomson Newspapers.

In 1939 Mr. Hastings moved to Toronto where he was employed with Hous and Mann. He served as an army staff sergeant during the war, and joined the army in 1948 and retired three years ago. Since then he had been employed with a printing firm, Commercial Clearing House. He was a Mason and a member of the Toronto Scottish Ex-Sergeants Association.

He leaves his wife, Elsie Wadlow, a son David of Georgetown and daughter Mrs. Gary Mullen, Sudbury, eight grandchildren and a brother, Edward Hastings, Dunnville.

Funeral service on May 19 at the Trull Funeral Home was conducted by Rev. A. McCready of Metropolitan United Church. Interment was in Highland Memory Gardens.
