

# Beavers Startle Rigger World Upset Best Seniors For Title

Last Saturday Beavers put Georgetown on the rigger map by defeating 4 Senior League Clubs on their way, to victory in the Central-Ontario seven-a-side championship at, Camp Borden. It was a great victory for the legal squad and after the final game, the club secretary was surrounded by representatives of other clubs all trying to arrange future fixtures.

It was a stunning upset as Beavers were the only intermediate team in the 12 team tournament. Beavers had already applied for membership in the Senior League next fall, and they emphasized their intention most effectively in the presence of several directors of the Ontario Rigger Union.

The team that carried Beavers colours to victory was composed of Ken Adamson, Gord Lee, Dave Cokwell, Mark Heffron, Ed Mallett, Roger Newman and Captain Trevor Sampson. In the first round Beavers were drawn against Toronto Barbarians 1st team and although this was not a particularly outstanding game, due to Beavers' obvious nervousness, they managed to power their way past the heavier Barbs and end up on top winning 8-3.

Ken Adamson's speed on the wing was the difference in this game as he scored twice and captain Sampson converted once.

The second round saw Beavers pitted against another strong Toronto team, the Wanderers Firsts. Having overcome their nervousness by now, Beavers started to play their usual wide open type of game. Expecting the speed on the wing that Beavers showed in the first game,

Wanderers were surprised when the speed turned up in the centre as Roger Newman tore holes in Wanderers' defence to score 3 touchdowns. Trevor Sampson converted one to give Beavers an 11-0 lead at the half. Playing against a strong wind in the second half, the local boys conceded one unconverted T.D. and Beavers got through the second round, winning 11-3.

In the semi-final Georgetown came up against the team favoured to win the whole thing — the University of Toronto Blues. They were obviously the fittest and fastest team at the tournament and Beavers knew they had to come up with a big game to stay alive.

Beavers found themselves with a nice margin to work on after scoring two fast T.D.s, one by Roger Newman and one by Ed Mallett. Both were converted by Trevor Sampson.

The Blues showed their strength by coming back strongly for a well taken T.D. which was converted.

Roger Newman opened up the gap again by powering his way through the centre for another T.D., again converted by Skipper Sampson. In the 3rd half, Beavers concentrated on defensive tactics with Gord Lee, Mark Heffron and Dave Cokwell breaking up most of the Blues offensive thrusts with good hard tackling. Blues managed an unconverted T.D. after a penalty was assessed against Beavers on their own ten yard line. The final whistle which came shortly after, found Beavers still defending their goal line valiantly. Final score Beavers 18, U of T Blues 8. Beavers got a great lift from

beating the Blues and after an hour's rest came up against one of the top teams in the Province in the final game, the Toronto Nomads.

Nomads have a very heavy team which awed Beavers who have Ken Adamson at 123 lbs., Gord Lee at 180 and Mark Heffron at 140. But speed proved to be the deciding factor as Beavers won 8-5 in a very tight contest. Roger Newman and Trevor Sampson provided the edge with the skipper appropriately getting the winning T.D. Again Mark Heffron and Gord Lee provided the defensive touch with some fabulous tackling and covering.

ODD NOTE: The skipper of the Nomad team (a great guy and wonderful rigger player) Ken Hogg, by name, was one of the original 4 founder members of the Beavers back in the Spring of '63.

OVERALL NOTES: Everyone played their hearts out (they all collapsed on the field after final game) with Newman being outstanding offensively and Heffron, Lee and Adamson fabulous on defense. At presentation ceremony later (at which team received beautiful trophy and 7 small individual ones) Skipper Sampson praised and thanked his squad for a 100 per cent effort in the games. This was a great day for Beavers as they have been threatening to bust into senior company since last fall. This was the icing on the cake. As a result of the victory Beavers won a spot in the All-Ontario Seven championship to be held next Saturday at Aurora.

Also next Sunday at the Park at 3:00 p.m. — Georgetown vs. NOMADS (the team they beat in the final).

## Thirty-Eight Speakers In New Arena System

If you're one of the hundreds who have strained an ear trying to detect an intelligible word from the muffled stuttering that periodically flowed from the public address system at the Georgetown arena during sports events and other occasions, your frustration is over.

The arena board replaced the old four-belled speaker box suspended over the centre of the arena floor with something new — and audible. 38 "curv-line radiator" speakers were installed over the seating area last week as well as two "remote" speakers in the lobby and arena office.

The system includes a new mike, controls and taped music. It cost \$605.

The system was tried publicly for the first time during a wrestling show Friday night.

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
