Sewer, Water Problems For Proposed Subdivision

A proposed sixty acre subdivision off highway 25 on Concession 2, seems doomed due to sewage and water difficulties, according to a report Monday night.

The lots in the proposed Glen Spay Development are on different elevations, and this combined with poor soil for tile beds, makes sewage disposal by septic tank very difficult, said the Medical Officer. He went on to suggest a small sewage disposal plant, or an approved lagoon.

"Sewage and water or no registered plan of subdivision", commented Councillor G. Currie.
