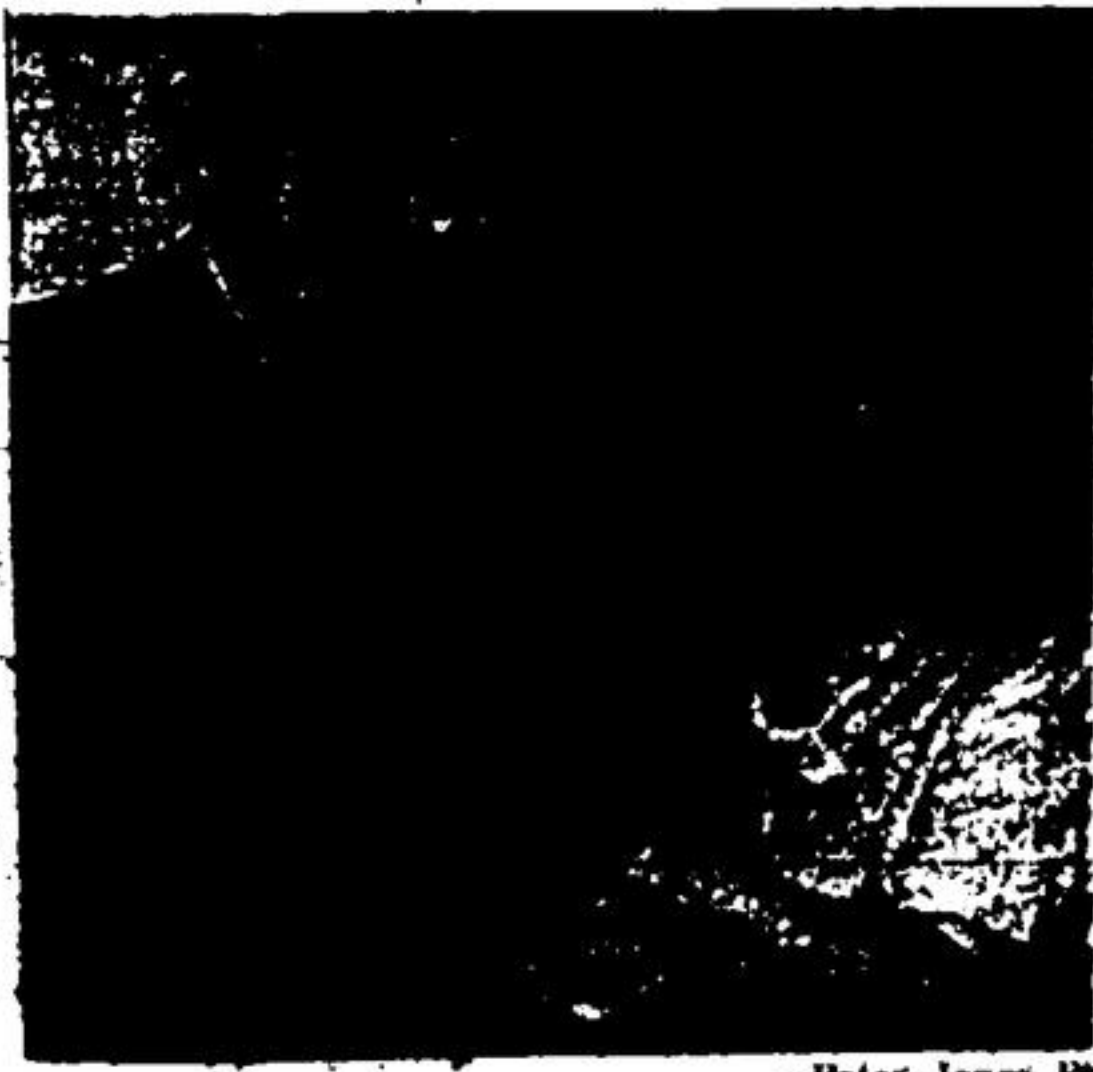

The lovely singing of a 50-voice choir of young boys and girls filled the auditorium on Thursday night, May 14th, when Mr. Bernard Shrubsole of Georgetown conducted a concert presented by the Junior Choir of Alderwood United Church in Toronto. Mr. Shrubsole is the music director of the choir. He played all the accompaniments on the organ and announced the various selections.

The choir sang eight choral numbers, of which six were sacred songs, and two secular. All the songs were sung in very fine fashion, but two selections, Praise Shall Be Thine and Follow the Road, seemed particularly lovely. The two secular songs, the singing of which proved the versatility of the choir were The Parade of the Wooden Soldiers and The Voice in the Old Village Choir. A triple duet of young girls sang Never Lonely and Mrs. H. Thackeray sang a soprano solo, I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked. Both selections were greatly admired.

Chocolate milk and fancy macaroons and cookies were served after the program and the boys and girls mingled with the residents. Mr. Shrubsole was greeted by many friends who had known him when he was a member of the staff at the Manor.

Next Sunday Maple Avenue Baptist Church will observe its ninth anniversary and its third year in their own church building. To mark the occasion, the congregation has brought four outstanding musicians from Toronto to put on a Sacred Concert this Sunday evening at 7 p.m.

At that time the members and adherents of Maple Ave. Baptist Church will pause to give thanks for nine years of blessing. The church was organized in 1955 with ten charter members and a Sunday School of 17.
