## Happy News for Town.

With 'back to work' at Smith & Stone this week, Coorgetown people are looking happier. The 7 week strike at the town's largest industry had cast a gloom over this normally happy town, affecting as it did, some 542 men and women directly and almost everyone else in an inderect way.

Aside from the obvious economic facfors which a strike entails, there is a sidaeffect in social relationships which can have bad effects. Small-town people are so closely linked in church, fraternal and recreation organizations that a major labour dispute makes everyone uncomfortable.

It is to the credit of our residents in general that there were a minimum of incidents of any fasting importance. Union and management exhibited cool heads at times when trouble might have started and there were few occasions when tension mounted beyond the bounds of reasonable-

What could have been a civic tragedy on Salurday turned out to have a happy ending also when Mayor Gibbons had a harrowing experience at the Mount Pleasant railway crossing. With car stalled on the tracks and a Georgatown-bound train only yards away, Mr. Gibbons had time to get out of his car And though he was unsuccessful in everting the train striking his car, he escaped unharmed.

We can thus be thankful on two counts this week - the end of a serious labour dispute and the knowledge that our chief civic officer has been spared from injury or

## Pay One Way or Another

An impending debenture, recommended by the Dept. of Municipal Affairs to clear a daticit in the town's water department, points to the fact that you have to pay for what you get. y

For several years' the water department has not paid its way. There was a time when a book-keeping separation was not made in the town books and water could be subsidized by the general tax rate. But with an accounting evolution, water became a separate business and costs became much more obvious. A recommendation for a rate increase by the 1963 water committee was turned down by council. There was some politics involved, because for some reason, water rates are something on which people keep a much sharper eye than many other necessary household expenditures.

We don't like to increase our cost of living any more than the next person, but we honestly can't see why people will complain about the cost of water. For little more than \$2.00 a month, we get a product which we can drink, use for cooking, bathing, car washing and lawn spraying. It is an absolute necessity for our health and sanitation. Many heating systems require it. We keep down dust on our roads, boil eggs, use it for our les and coffee. It fills home swimming pools, cools off our summer drinks, is used in refrigeration systems.

And all this for a couple of dollars a month, less than we spand to read a daily: paper, not much more than we pay to have our garbage removed.

But whether we like it or not, the water which we use in town must be paid! for in one way or another. If the water; department is to operate at a loss it must have a subsidy from the general tax rate Whichever way it is done, it comes from the taxpayer's pocket, and there is no fairy godmother to wave a wand and pruvide our water supply without payment.

## Many Aids for Students


