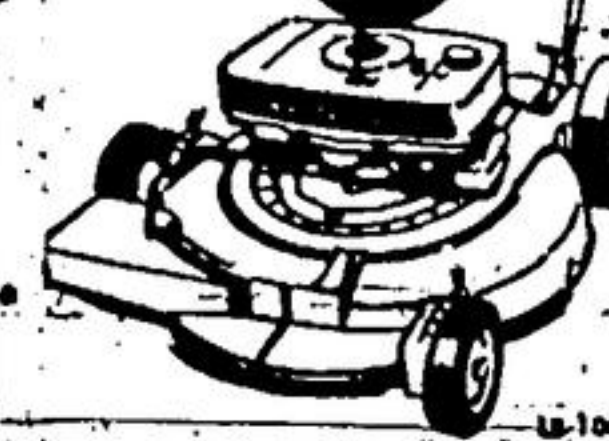

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Convince Council Better Road Needed in Subdivision

With E. W. Binkley as spokesman, a group of residents of the Orr subdivision appeared successful in convincing council Monday that a permanent surface should be installed this year on their roads. Mr. Binkley said they had just learned that instead of a planned asphalt surface, council would tar and chip the roads. He explained that the subdivision had very little road work in its first two years, and in 1961 residents had declined sidewalks but were happy to know that the roads would be prepared for surfacing and curbs and gutters added.

The area pays \$18,000 in taxes, he pointed out and permanent surfacing would save the town money in the long run. Mayor Gibbons explained that at a road committee meeting the question had been discussed and a decision made to proceed with the cheaper job. Road chairman Wm. V. Hunter said the committee had voted 8-1 this way, though he personally favours blacktop at a cost of \$3,000 over tar and chips estimated at \$200.

With some other councillors intimating they would change their opinion, the matter was referred back to the road committee for further study.
