Set Dates Y Day Camp To Run Through July

A four week day camp for children 8 to 12 years of age will be operated by the George town and District YMCA-CWCA next month. Both the senior staff members and counsellors participate in an intensive pre-camp training program. A Y brochure on the camp Campers may attend one, two, three or all of the sessions. Camp days are Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Pickup points will be Loblaw's and the Georgetown Dairy. The boys and girls will leave for the camp at 9 o'clock and return home around 4 p.m. A maximum of fifty campers will be admitted for each period. A camp director and five Camp Counsellors will operate the camp. Those enrolled for each week will be divided into groups of two with two counsellors assigned to each group.

Town May Buy Girl's School As Centennial Project

Purchase of the Cedarvale Balkind who comprise the fee had discussed property School for Girls property as a future recreation and cultural centre may be Georgetown's 1967 centennial project. The school, which closed in 1962, is for sale at an asking price of \$130,000. A centennial committee hopes to have the property acquired at a meeting Tuesday of the YMYWCA and other local groups. Earlier Tuesday, the committee had discussed property owned by Delrex Developments in the eastern part of town, but reported to the meeting that it had not been possible to get a definite purchase price. A plan must be submitted to the government before August 1 in order to qualify for a \$200 per capita grant available for centennial projects. Attendees at the meeting seemed agreed that the Cedarvale property should be acquired by the town while it is still available. It is relatively central and has unlimited development possibilities for public use.

S & S Employees Petition To Dump Mineworkers Union

A number of Smith and Stone wage earners have taken dissatisfaction on the part that even some who voted to settle at the recent ratification meeting in the Memorial Arena favour throwing out the United Mine Workers of America. A company employee told The Herald that friction had grown because a percentage of the members felt the union had not represented them well enough at the bargaining table, and because of the system of welfare payments. The source said a number of the Local 50 members of the Local 50 United Mine Workers had dropped out of their positions expressing their dissatisfaction. The attempt to break with the United Mine Workers of America is as large as the rumour in the UMA basket.
