## Gov't Will Finance Sunshine Locals Turn to Other Projects

Pre-school classes, home care, effective in 1965 will mean an adult workshop and recreation for the retarded in this the 7th Line of Esquimaux and area will be some of the "new other schools for the retarded avenues" of service the North in Ontario will receive an annual grant to cover in full all Halton Association for Retarded Children will concentrate on operating costs when new legislation next January eliminates the need for raising the operating costs of Sunshine School.

A news release from the Association this week says that legislation which becomes effective in 1965 will mean simply enable us to release our energies to open up new avenues.

Mr. Holliday was recently appointed to a full time position with the Ontario Association as Co-ordinator of Special Projects.

"This does not mean our job is done," said Brian Holliday a member of the Ontario Association for Retarded Children. "Locally a retarded children education authority will be established consisting of 6 members. Of these six, two will be appointed by the North Halton Association for Retarded Children and four appointees will be drawn from within the North Halton area."

When asked if the provincial government will assume the responsibility for the existing mortgage of \$5,000 on the Sunshine School Mr. Holliday answered with a definite "no."

Mr. Holliday went on to explain the J. K. Kennedy Memorial Fund for the Mentally Retarded, he said it would be used in order to benefit all retardates in Canada. He likened it to the Telephone Fund operated by Channel 9 when it opened out of that came a visiting professorship, a loan fund set up to assist local associations, financing of teachers workshops and seminars, and other projects.

Mr. Holliday said with the lifting of the financial burden of operating Sunshine School he felt the North Halton Association was ready to do something for the adults. He said an adult workshop seminar was to be held in Toronto a few days hence and part of the program would be geared to local groups just starting a workshop. William Treahy of Georgetown was appointed the delegate from North Halton.

In 1963 the total cost of operating Sunshine School was \$14,000. Grants provincial and municipal, totalled \$6,000 which left \$7,400 for the Association to raise.

The guest speaker was introduced by Mrs. George Mitchell and thanked by Paul Armstrong. In the absence of Dr. K. McCauley, president, the meeting was conducted by Dr. H. Greig, vice president. All in all are Georgetown people.

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### Was Past President of Acton Legion Branch

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### Selecting Five from Here For Auxiliary Police Force

Recruiting of five Georgetown men to become auxiliary policemen will begin soon. The five part-time policemen are Georgetown's contribution to the 30-man Halton County Auxiliary Police Force for the county's Emergency Measures Organization.

Ten men from Oakville and Burlington, and five from Georgetown and Milton will be required.

The Georgetown Police Dept. however, is not asking for applicants, Chief Constable Roy Haley said the five will be hand-picked by contacting good potential officers and informing them they have a chance if they are interested in taking on the duties.

Booklets outlining the duties have been printed and will be given to a selected few to study. Training will begin in the fall.

Volunteer qualifications are similar to those of the regular police forces, Canadian citizenship, 21 years of age, minimum height of 5'8" and weight 150 lbs. A spokesman for the EMO said the requirements will be elastic however.

The force will supply, in the event of an emergency, extra men required by the regular police force.

In the event of a major emergency, the EMO police will establish themselves at control points to keep traffic moving towards designated rescue areas, and on evacuation routes.

The escape routes for Halton county residents have not been designated yet. Routes must be picked with care and on a provincial basis to prevent interference with the escape lines of other towns and cities.

EMO police training will be held at night and will consist of lectures, drills, practical training with regular policemen, traffic control and first aid instruction.

The auxiliaries will be provided with a uniform, distinguished from the regular police uniforms by a shoulder patch. They will receive no pay.
