SUMMER JOB PICTURE

So Many Jobs for Students Growers Can't Get Pickers

Fruit and vegetable growers in the Georgetown area are crying for summer work opportunities and stores and some are lower grade high school students are looking for summer employment, but getting them together is not as easy as it appears.

The National Employment officer serving the Georgetown area told The Herald this week that a "desperate shortage of help in the fruit and vegetable industry" was shaping up for the summer and unless the lower school students turn to this form of summer employment the shortage could be critical.

The Employment office is having little trouble placing students in jobs for which their university and upper high school grades status qualifies them and the demand for students services is continuing.

"There are lots of summer employment opportunities for the Georgetown male students in the construction and manufacturing field and in the harvesting of fruit and vegetable crops," local NES office manager Charles Frazer told The Herald.

"A few local employers have a regular policy of hiring university and high school students to replace persons going on vacation and to allow for seasonal increases in business," he said. "But most of these employers hire these students early in the year."

The crisis is in the market for gardeners and fruit crop field workers where crop growers are having a rough time finding enough able bodied young people to fill the seasonal requirements.

"The jobs don't pay as well as those available to the better qualified, naturally, but they do pay well."

One of the major problems of getting the young high school students and crops beside the guest of honor's growers together has been transportation, but that isn't a factor anymore since growers will arrange daily pickups at convenient points in town.

The fact is students in their early teens would rather avoid the outdoor work healthy as it is according to the NES.

There will be the usual opportunities for females in restaurants and stores and some opportunities in manufacturing in the area," Mr. Frazer said. "Many from here will head for the tourist resorts and indications are they'll find employment," he said. "The tourists are interested in hiring students for the summer for such jobs as cooks, helpers, waiters, waitresses, chamber maid, cabin girls, camp counsellors, recreation directors, lifeguards, swimming instructors, and salesclerks in gift shops and souvenir stores."

"Whenever students register for work we always discuss both the fruit and vegetable growing industry and the tourist industry first because of their tremendous seasonal requirements," Mr. Frazer said. "Applicants for jobs in tourist areas, however, should be at least eighteen years of age."

CVCA Hopes to Plant Fifteen Million Trees

"The Credit Valley Conservation Authority has planted a million and a half trees in the ten years since it was formed," J. A. Carr, chairman of the Reafforestation and Wildlife Advisory Board told the members at the May meeting recently.

"I hope," he continued, "that we can plant 15 million in the next decade. During this past spring there were 317,000 trees planted in the watershed and this acts a new record for the Authority." Mr. Carr reported that his Advisory Board had toured the area and trees planted in previous years were growing well.

One "human interest" story that came out of the tree-planting program this spring was about a group of high school boys in the Alton area, hired to hand-plant a rocky knoll near the village. N. J. McMahon, general superintendent, said that several of the boys became so enthusiastic that they each planted 5,000 trees per-day.
