RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Bridge Club Peach TARTS

Makes twelve 3 1/2 inch tarts or twenty 2 1/2 inch tarts

Drain Peaches. Stir 2 (15oz) cans Canada Choice Sliced Peaches 1 1/2 cups peach syrup 1/4 cup sugar 2 tablespoons corn starch A few grains salt 1/2 teaspoon almond flavouring 1/2 pint dairy sour cream

Whipped cream (optional) 1 1/2 cups peach syrup into sugar, corn starch, salt combined in saucepan; thicken smoothly over medium heat stirring constantly. Cover and cook 5 minutes over low heat, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and cool completely. Stir in almond flavouring and sour cream, fold in peach slices. Spoon into prepared tart shells. Chill. Serve topped with whipped cream if desired.
