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Escapes Gorge Plunge When Car Misses Curve

A Campbellville man came within a few feet of dropping into the gorge at the north end of Main St. early Tuesday morning after he missed the turn in the road.

Donald Keith Moffatt, R.R. 1 Campbellville, was northbound on Main when he drove his car off the pavement unknowingly.

Police said Moffatt hit the brakes when he realized his mistake but not in time to a void clipping off a hydro pole near Ontario St. The late model Ford skidded sideways for some distance toward the gorge, but a row of light trees held it at the edge.

The accident happened shortly after midnight and was investigated by Cpl R. D. Whittson.

Five hundred dollars damage resulted when cars driven by Mrs. Joy Reese of 52 Shelley St. and Wallace Gordon, Acton, collided at the Rexway Dr. Prince Charles Dr. corner Monday.

The Gordon car was proceeding east on Prince Charles, and the Reese car was northbound on Rexway when they hit. The only injury was a minor head bruise suffered by Mrs. Reese.

A rear end collision at the intersection of Guelph and Water-Streets crumpled the back end of a Volkswagen for \$125 last Thursday.

The driver, Joy Diane Barber, 13 Normandy Blvd, was stopped at the corner of Water St. waiting to make a left turn.

Leader Ceases Publication After 3 Years Business

Georgetown is served by only one weekly newspaper this week - The Herald.

Last week's issue of The Georgetown Leader was its last. The 3-year-old business closed its office unannounced on Thursday and posted a sign on the door "Inquiries at 232 Guelph St" (the Delrex Developments office building).

The business was incorporated in 1961 with an issue of seventy \$500 preference shares and 500 common shares of no par value and listed seven provisional directors.

The business originally operated in the Delrex building, later moving to a store in Delrex Market Centre. The paper was typeset and printed by Dills Printing & Publishing, Acton.

Appraise Land for Highway Widening

Used Comb to Aid Chum Convulsed After Fall

A noon hour game of grabbing for the cross brace on the guy wire of a telephone pole proved disastrous last Wednesday for fourteen year old Jim McDowell of 30 Ray-lawn Crescent, when his fingers slipped and he fell flat on his back and head suffering a bad concussion.

The blow on the head caused him to have a convulsion for the first time in his life. Mrs. L. Raymer of Weber Drive rushed out and tried to pry his mouth open so he wouldn't bite his tongue, however she just wasn't strong enough. His chum, Peter Nell, managed to open his mouth and stick a comb between his teeth, preventing biting and choking.

Jim was rushed immediately to Georgetown Hospital where he was kept till Saturday. No skull fracture was found but he does have the concussion. He is being watched carefully for complications.

County Eyeing School As Home for Prisoners

Langdon Urges Cedarvale Be Bought for Half-Way House

While Georgetown is showing interest in acquiring the Merry of Burlington school if there was money involved it led waters, Warden G. Gallag-Cedarvale School for Girls that should have come to the fore as a recreational centre as a Centennial Year project, Judge K. M. Langdon would like to see it used as a half-way house, a temporary home for released prisoners.

Reeve J. Elliott of Georgetown claimed that lawyers' opinion was that the county would be responsible for the detention areas and that the facilities were excellent. Dep. Reeve W. Hunter phrased that it was not a de-

temptation home at all. Trying to pour oil on troubled waters, Warden G. Gallagher opined that any half-way house he had heard about was paid from public subscription. "This report," he continued, "is just to keep you informed, nothing definite has been done." Reeve J. Elliott of Georgetown claimed that some residents in the area would object to Cedarvale being turned into a half-way house.

Promote Industry, Cooperate with Developer is Plea of Councillor

Cr. Bill Smith made an impassioned appeal at Monday's council meeting for industrial promotion and cooperation with the town's largest landowner, Delrex Developments.

"These are on the top of my list if Georgetown is to improve and move ahead" said the councillor. "It's time we got all our bad publicity, Delrex has made lots of mistakes and so has the town."

He urged a new industrial commission, divorced from council, and the creation of a "new town image" which would induce industry to locate here.

Five councillors had attended a meeting last week with the firm's president Rex Iles, said Cr. Smith "and while not too much was accomplished, at least we sat down for an amicable discussion."

He urged a further talk with June 23 as a tentative date. Cr. Smith wants an industrial commissioner, and he was joined by Cr. Young in urging that money be spent on promotion.

"Brampton spends \$50,000 a year, while one of our news-papers criticized the chairman every time he spent a few dollars last last year" said Cr. Young more promotion. Cr. Smith said Deputy Reeve Hunter, as chairman, had spent money from his own pocket and termed it "disgrace Mr. Ilesop, Cr. Hildebrandt that his expenses weren't paid by the town."

Cr. Hildebrandt said Georgetown has nothing to advertise until the town has some agreement with the largest landowner and also stressed the importance of keeping talks between the town and subdivision of the remarks and read extracts from letters he had written in which he referred to the town's unlimited supply of water, fully serviced land lop, said Cr. Smith "and while available, high education standards and readily available land for hour supply."

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"Brampton is on the wane" he said "and I am confident Georgetown is coming into its own. I want council to know I've been making outstanding efforts and have enlisted the help of our local M.P.P. to encourage industry."

Cr. Smith still pressed for an active industrial commission, pointing out that leads should be discussed by the commission and that more people means more promotion.
