Initially developed by the Sixteen-Mile Creek Conservation Authority, the area has since come under the jurisdiction of the newly formed Halton Region Conservation Authority, a merger of the Twelve-Mile and Sixteen-Mile Conservation Authorities.

A 341 acre expanse of rolling hills centred by the huge dam forming an 85 acre lake. It is the first of its type in the area.

Located 3 1/2 miles north west of Milton, it is the first official opening of an area created by the former Sixteen-Mile Authority while the Twelve-Mile Authority opened the Battiscombe Point and Carleton Conservation Areas in 1962.
