A small refreshment booth opened recently at Terra Cot. It was generally agreed to have raised angry protests on his park before the bylaw from surrounding landowners which ruled his property as agricultural. Farmed Over Fifty Years at Union A. Hancock Dies

An RR 4 farmer for over fifty years, Ambrose Hancock, 75, died in Georgetown hospital on June 4. Mr. Hancock was born in Highbridge, Somerset and came to Canada in 1866. He worked for a year on a farm at Ashgrove, returned to England where he married Annie Sawidge, and they came back to this country to live at Meadowdale. In 1912 he purchased the Great farm at RR 4, Georgetown. He specialized in Holstein cattle. He was a member of Union Presbyterian Church. He was predeceased by his wife in 1961, and a daughter Florence, he leaves a family of 7 children, Mrs. H. Stayer (Helen), Joseph, Mrs. W. McCutcheon (May), Thomas and Mrs. G. Gilmer (Ivy) of Toronto; Herbert and Charles of Glen Williams, 24 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren.

He was predeceased by brothers John and Harry. Rev. Robert Duncanson conducted the funeral service on June 6 at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. DISTRICT NEWS AT A GLANCE

**BRAMPTON** - Increased safety measures for the diversion highway in Brampton will be sought by the town's council. Ten youngsters have been drowned and four have been pulled out safely since the diversion was built in 1950.

**CHINGACOUSY** - The Fire Marshall's office is investigating two fires which pulled the entire township fire department out of bed early Sunday morning, June 7. The investigation is being conducted at the request of the fire chief who suspects both were set deliberately and fed with liquid fuel.

**STREETSVILLE** - Streetsville council has voted to back Toronto Township in its battle to try and defeat Metro's attempted "freeze" of 20,000 acres of township lands until 1980. They believe it would have a damaging effect on the town's financial position.

**CAMBELLVILLE** - Artificial respiration administered by a 71-year-old grandfather was responsible for reviving his 16-month-old grandson after the baby was found face down and submerged in a watering trough near Campbellville last Thursday. David Brown was apparently dead when his grandfather, George Brown, found him.

**OAKVILLE** - An offer of 1,200 acres of north Oakville land had been rejected by Milton. The offer was made by Oakville in hope of an amicable settlement of a proposal by Milton to annex land outside Oakville's northern boundaries.

**MILTON** - The \$55,000 community swimming pool in Rotary Park will be opened for this season sometime during the week of June 21. The 12 id water restrictions which have been in force throughout the town have made it impossible to fill the pool to date.

**BURLINGTON** - North Burlington residents on Burlington council raised strong objection last week to a proposal that the town adopt an eight ward system instead of the present nine wards. As a result of the stiff opposition, the clerk prepared maps for eight, nine and ten ward systems.
