At left, George Muckart, a veteran of the Georgetown Lawn Bowling Club delivers a bowl on the green at the corner of William and Edith Sts. The club, the oldest organized recreation organization in town, holds jitneys at least 3 times weekly, once for the women members, once for the men,

and again, usually on the weekend, for mixed competition. Lawn bowling is most like curling in that the bowler delivers his bowl in a curved line, and attempts to have it stop near a centre point. In curling the target centre is the "button"—in this case it's the "kitty". The bowl itself varies from an alley bowling ball in that it has two "flat" sides, one of which is weighted to cause it to curve. The ardent lawn bowlers maintain it is an art, and any novice who has watched his bowl wander and fall well away from the kitty is first to agree. Campbell Spoils No-Hitter But Hughes Hews Giants

Giant first baseman Bill Campbell saved Georgetown from being on the wrong end of a no-hitter in Wallace Park, Oakville, Saturday, June 6.

Campbell, the second batter in the eighth inning lined a clean single to spoil veteran Gary Hughes bid for a no hit game in the Halton Intermediate League fixture.

Hughes came within six outs of pitching the no hitter as the league leaders subdued the league trailers 16-1.

Dennis Gibbons, first batter in the inning, had reached base on an error and went on to score on a sacrifice by losing pitcher Bernie Dore to end Hughes' shutout bid as well.

After Campbell's single, Hughes retired the next six batters without allowing the ball to be hit out of the infield.

Hughes walked two and two other Giants reached base on error. He faced just 32 batters and set down 14 on strikes.

His pitching over-shadowed a fine display of slugger put on by left fielder Joe Vukovich.

Vukovich uncoiled a pair of homers and a single to spark the potent Oak attack.

Oaks first runs against Bernie Dore crossed the plate as early as the second inning, when they came up with three runs.

It was the second game in which Dore, ace of the Giant mound staff, was forced to pitch the distance in spite of constant bombardment by the opposition.

"Toronto and Albion townships are closing," he added, "and I don't see why we should stay open."

Councillor Harold Wilson seconded Mr. Blair's motion, noting that the area was coming close to the point where there will be no shooting at all. Mr. Wilson later voted against the motion.
