Special Police Training Starts In September

Training Starts In September

Training for the EMO sponsored Halton County auxiliary police force will tentatively begin September 29 and will last until December 15 it was learned last week.

Georgetown will supply five of the thirty men making up the force.

Advertising for the men to form a nucleus of the auxiliary force was carried in several county papers last week and applications have already started trickling in.

The course for the applicants will be held in Oakville Armoury.

The tentative date for the course was set at an EMO meeting recently.

The committee also learned that the town of Acton will not supply candidates for the auxiliary leaving Oakville and Burlington to provide ten men each and Georgetown and Milton, five men each.

The trainers can be expected to attend one weekly session, lasting two hours each, but before they are accepted they must furnish information related to their appointment as special constables, take the oath of office and swear allegiance, submit to fingerprints and be photographed.

They can drop out of the auxiliary police ranks, if they so wish, as the organization is purely voluntary, and they will be able to transfer to another area, if they move and if the area has a vacancy.

They will receive no pay, but will be furnished with uniforms and equipment during the training course, mileage will be paid at the rate of 10 cents a mile - for trainees using their cars to reach the training location. Candidates are expected however to operate on a car pool basis.

Candidates for the EMO-Halton auxiliary police, after having completed the training course, will be interviewed by the police department's liaison officer. During the interview they will be assessed as to their qualities, and fill an application form, if accepted.

Firearms will be issued only under extreme conditions, and they will ride police cars only in company of a regular officer, and only on authorized assignments.

COUNTY COUNCIL

County Assessment, Population Both Increase Over Six Per Cent

The equalized assessment by-law passed last week by Halton County Council showed a total assessment of \$271,115,819 for the whole county, an increase of 7.38 per cent over last year.

Also increased this time by 6.32 per cent was the population figure. The population now stands at 129,111.

The assessment figures are the basis for the percentage of costs borne by the different municipalities. Leader is Oakville which will pay 44.62 per cent, next is Burlington with 38.54 per cent, followed by Georgetown with 3.89 per cent, Milton with 3.28 per cent, and Nasasagaweya with 1.87 per cent.

Other interesting figures revealed in the Assessor's report showed the much talked about industrial-residential ratio in the municipalities to vary greatly.

The lowest residential percentage 51.7 per cent is held by Acton. By municipalities it goes like this:

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**Police To Crack Down Souped-Up Noisy Cars**

Some of the ear-driving cowboys now thundering around Georgetown streets in souped-up junk buggies will be on foot in a matter of days, Chief Roy Haley said today in a move to revise the Highway Traffic Act which is now in process and when completed his department will be empowered to take cars making "unnecessary noise" off the road.

Commenting on the new legislation, Magistrate James Black said a conviction of causing unnecessary noise may soon cost a first offender up to 10 times the maximum penalty now imposed.

In court last week Magistrate Black told a district youth, "It may interest you and some of your like within a matter of days a revision of the Highway Traffic Act will allow a minimum fine of \$10 and a maximum of \$50 - and maximum fine of \$5 - and maximum fine of \$10. The first offender will also face a license suspension of up to one year."

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
