

Georgetown's "Mr. Hydro" Retires Gerry McCallum Here 23 Years

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Foreman, in directing the out-

side staff. Gerald McCallum, known to his many friends as "Gerry", came to the Georgetown Hydro as Superintendent in the Spring of 1941 from the Fenelon Falls Water, Light and Power Company. He was interviewed and hired for the new position of Superintendent by the 1961 Commission which included Mayor Joseph Gibbons, who by a coincidence is again Mayor of Georgetown and a member of the Commission. Mr. McCallum continued as superintendent until June 1 this year.

A native of Fenelon Falls, Ontario, Gerald McCallum attended grade and secondary schools there. After completing his formal education, he worked for 16 years for his father, a prominent tailor in Fenelon Falls. Then Gerry McCallum worked for a year in a garage business in Fenelon Falls. In 1931, he became Superintendent of Fenelon Falls Water, Light and Power Company and ten years later moved to become Superintendent of Georgetown Hydro.

Mr. McCallum and his wife have been well known residents of Georgetown since 1941. He is a member of the United Church and he also is a member at the Masonic order.

Gerry McCallum in recent years has become keenly interested in photography and also has enjoyed flying as a passenger in light aircraft. He has taken several unusual photos from the air.

During the 23 years that Gerry McCallum has been associated with Georgetown Hydro System, he has witnessed many changes. This has been a period of phenomenal growth for the community and the Georgetown Hydro and Gerry McCallum directed most of the line work and improvements to the system in that period.

Helson Queries Efficiency Of Alcohol Content Tests

The efficiency of breath-alcohol subject to deterioration. Magistrate Langdon replied across Canada was questioned that when the introduction of the machines occurred in Magistrates court by a Georgetown lawyer.

"I am quite concerned about the operation of the machines," Frederick A. Helson told Magistrate Kenneth Langdon during the trial of his client charged with impaired driving. As for the accuracy of the breathalyzer machines used to determine whether or not a person has consumed enough liquor to be considered impaired, Helson said they are only effective when properly used. "Machines do get out of kilter," he said adding, "therefore they should be checked after each accused is tested."

Police constable Carman Wright said the machine is tested between the first and second test but not after the second. Helson said he felt counsel should always question the efficiency of sobriety tests which he noted are electrical and
