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## Hike 'Salary Schedule for County Public Health Nurses

An acute shortage of public health nurses exists in Halton County, it was revealed at Halton County Council Tuesday afternoon, June 16 when board of Health Chairman W. Leslie reported there would be ten vacancies by September.

"This could seriously deplete our staff," added Dr. B. Young, Dep. Reeve of Nassagaweya, "in fact, it is half our complement."

It was felt the low minimum starting salary was to blame for the lack of results from the advertisement.

A recommendation from the Board of Health for increased salaries for 1965 which they could set out in advertisements precipitated an hour and half long wrangle on procedure.

Basically the argument settled on the fact that all salaries are reconsidered at the same time by the Personnel Committee, rather than having individual hikes at any time.

However, as Koeve G. Leslie pointed out emphatically after a debate, "This is an emergency, why can't we throw the whole darned procedure out the window and use a little common sense?"

At this point there were "hear, hear" from the press table.

It took two recorded votes to have the public health nurses alone given a hike in pay from a starting salary of \$3,500 to a starting salary of \$4,500, with maximum raised from \$4,000 to \$7,500.

While these will not be effective till January, 1965, since this year's budget is set, it will enable the Board of Health to advertise the higher pay, and it is hoped, to attract some public health nurses to Halton.

## Check Scots Emigrants Fear Spread of Typhoid

Dr. A. F. Bull, medical officer of health for the county, told the Board of Health at a recent meeting that the names of all persons arriving in Canada from Scotland are being referred to the local Health Units, and a careful follow up is conducted.

He recalled that in 1900, Ontario's typhoid death rate was 20 per 100,000 population, with a case rate of 70 per 100,000. In 1960, however, there were 22 cases per 100,000 of population, and no deaths.

He praised today's effective methods of treatment, and said Halton had five cases in 1950, one in 1951, one in 1952 and one in 1953.

## Township Okays Birth Control

Chinguacousy Township Council has endorsed the distribution of birth control pills to welfare recipients in Peel County.

Most councillors commented briefly on the question before voting, at Monday's meeting, James Cathcart favored the pills as a means of cutting rising school costs, but added that they should only be given to those who requested them.

Frank Lyons thought someone should investigate the ages of welfare recipients. "If the pills are deemed necessary," he said, "they should be distributed." He voted against the pills.

Gordon Lowe expressed concern that the pills might be dangerous, but voted in favour of the recommendation.

Harold Wilson's terse statement, "I'm agin' it," was countered by Al Ferris equally brief, "I'm for it."

The motion carried with three in favor, two opposed.
