

Sock Firm Puts Best Foot Forward Beaumonts Predicting 25% Increase

The 86 year old Beaumont Knitting Co. Ltd. has embarked on an improvement program which will increase production by 25 per cent in the next year.

Gordon Graham in the company told The Herald this week that a huge new carding machine is being installed in a modernization program designed to replace some of the present machinery and add extra facilities.

Part of the reason for the increase is a government contract for 145,000 pairs of socks. Mr. Pearce says business is expected to substantially exceed last year according to a sales forecast.

Mr. Pearce and Mr. Graham purchased the business 6 1/2 years ago from Arthur Beaumont, whose father Joseph had preceded him in the family business. The mill, located in Glen Williams, employs 45 and is one of the Georgetown area's oldest businesses.

Vet's Act Amendment Not Enough - Harley

A proposal to amend the War Veterans Allowance Act does not go far enough, Dr. Harry Harley, M.P. for Halton, said in Ottawa last week. He was referring to a bill introduced by a private member which would allow payments of some portion of the allowance to World War I veterans who did not serve the required 366 days in the U.K.

Under the proposal a veteran who served less than one year would be eligible for a fraction of the allowance based on the number of days he had served. Dr. Harley said he agrees with the principal of the bill but disagrees with the proposal to fragmentize the allowance.

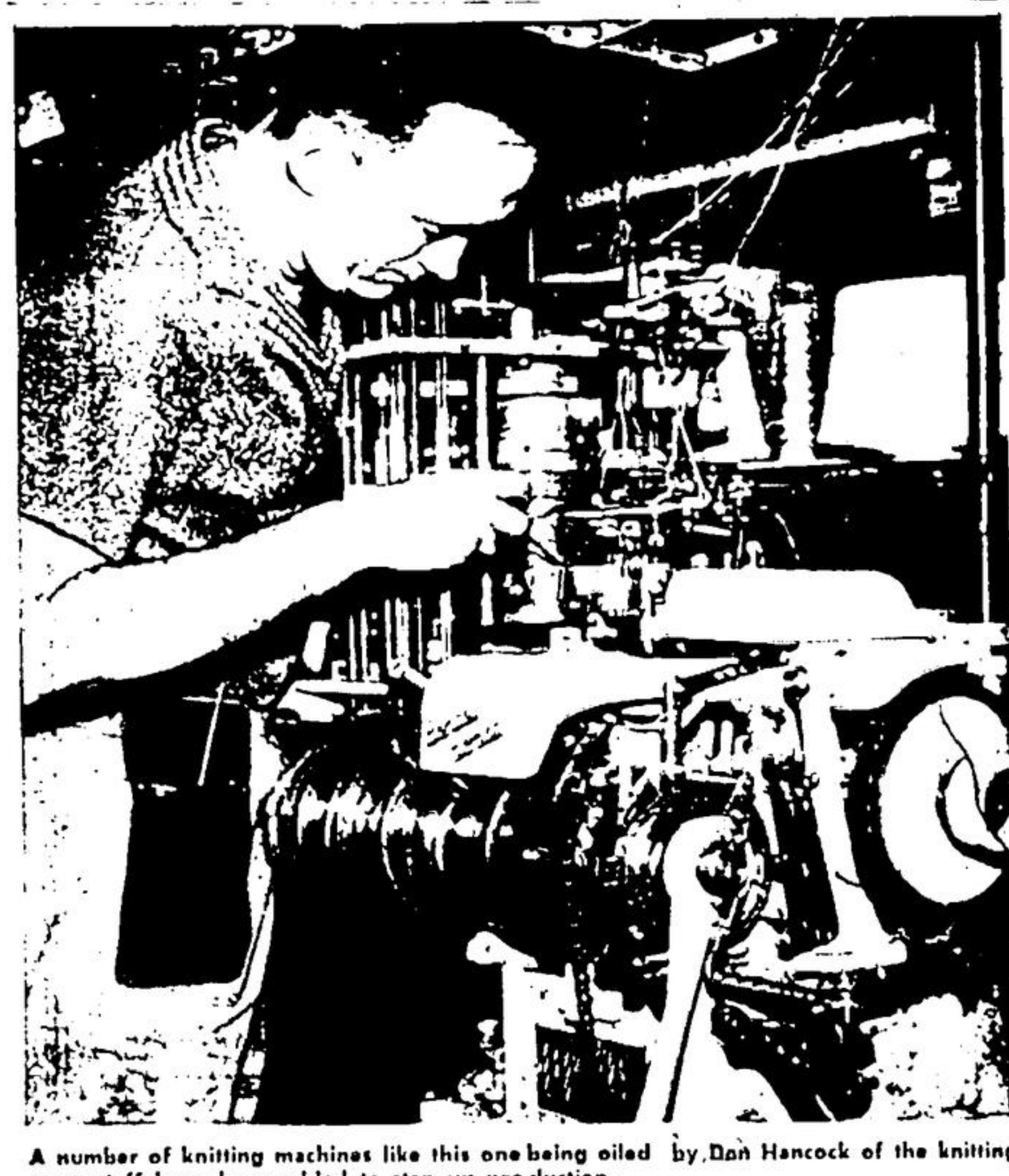
He pointed out that it would be possible for a veteran who had served only one day in the United Kingdom to qualify for the allowance. The present war veterans' allowance for a married man is \$144 a month and this would mean the veteran who served only one day would be eligible for 40 cents per month.

Barilow, Gordon, Architecture, 63. One 1st class honour, 2 seconds, and a third.

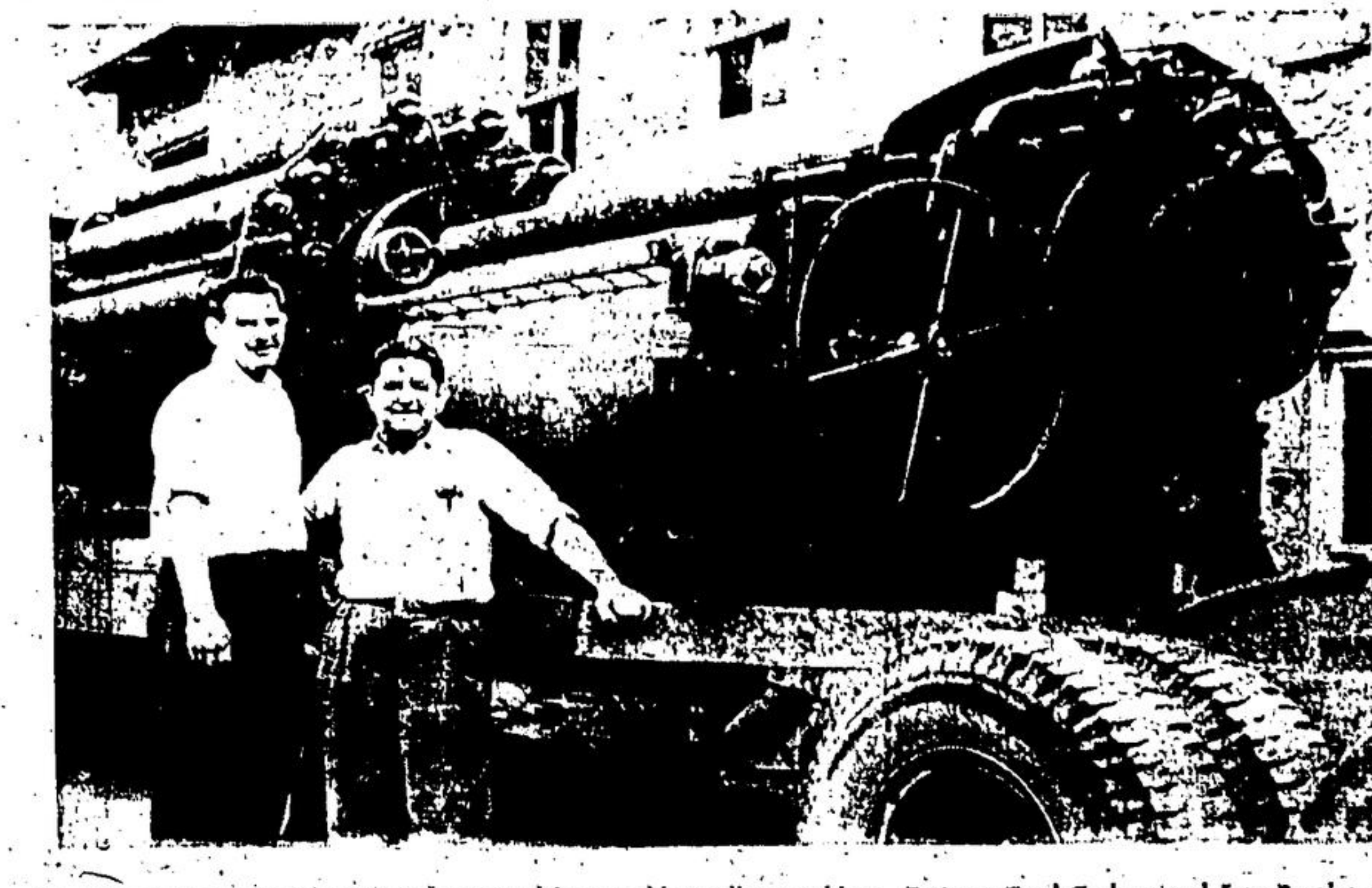
Bishop, Catherine, Home Economics 80. Four first class honours, and 1 third.
