Visiting Scot Warns . . .

Stop Sprawling Towns, Cities From Swallowing Existing Farmland

Provincial authorities should introduce restrictions to prevent expanding cities and towns from "swallowing" surrounding farm lands, a Scot farmer touring Ontario rural counties, and then on to said yesterday.

John Duncan, a 23-year-old representative of the Scottish Young Farmers' Club visiting estates in five Ontario counties his father, Duncan will report during a four-month stay, said by discussion and pictures in the urban development engulfing farm lands.

The "mushroom" type of growth which is affecting agriculture could be restricted by building up instead of round present structures, Duncan said referring to the construction of taller buildings and apartments.

Duncan also voiced concern of farms being purchased by persons interested in the value of the land instead of the cultivation of it.

"One of the biggest draw-fluenced by city standards, is being encouraged to buy land for value's sake," he said, adding the land then deteriorates.

We Drive to Telfordville And Meet a "Great Guy"

One of the requirements of the United Church of Canada for its candidates for the Ministry is that they spend at least two summers on what is known as a "student field." These are usually in sparsely populated areas of Canada, where regular church services are impossible. The student stays for twenty weeks during the summer as the minister for the little group of people under his pastoral care.

I have been more fortunate than most. My assignment for the summer of 1964 was to the Telfordville, Pastoral Charge under the Rev. Gerald Hutchison. This is a huge charge, both in area and in the numbers of people involved. It covers nearly one thousand square miles and serves more than 400 families from farming, oiling, and small business backgrounds and including a great ethnic mixture, all of which leads to a whole world of life being concentrated into this one charge.

The following are some of my memories, both happy and sad, as I look back at my summer's work from the first day until six weeks later.

It was a bright, sunny morning at the end of April when I left Georgetown. The Smith and Stone strike had just begun a short while before and as I left I wondered how long it would continue. I remember driving east out of town, passing Lane's trucks at the very starting another summer drive.
