All four Milton runs were scored by men who had reached base via the base on balls route. The youngster fanned seven and walked six, yielding just seven base hits.

Fine pitching by Toal pulled them out in the 8th and smart fielding saved Blair and Toal in the 9th when Blair walked 3 batters. Winning pitcher was Mike Toal. Georgetown had 9 hits, 13 runs and 8 errors. Oakville had 9 hits, 8 runs and 13 errors. The next game is against Dundas on Sunday at the park with Milton visiting on Monday night.

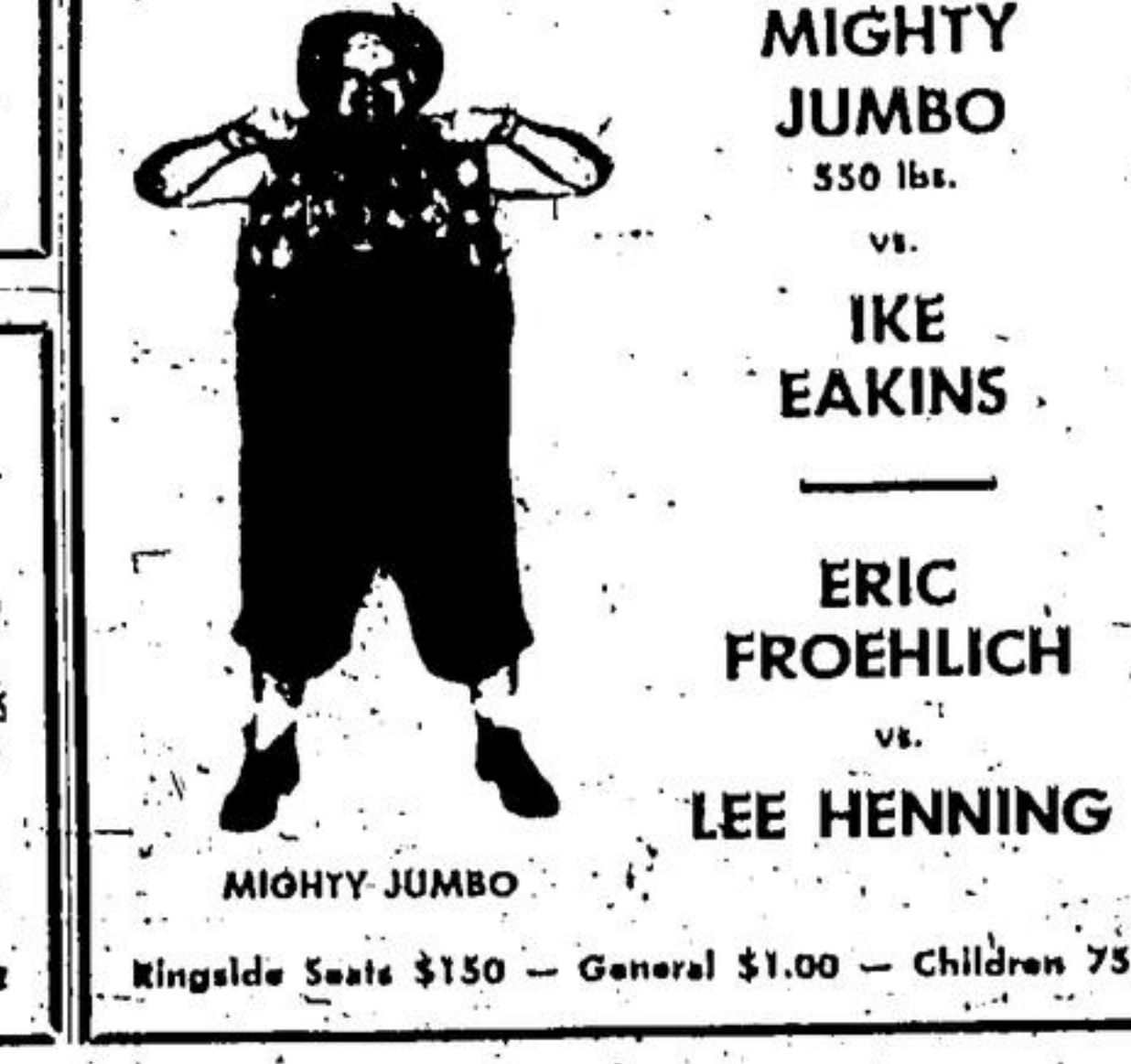
