COUNCIL BRIEFS

- Council on Monday finalized transfer of an east Georgetown property to the school board for a sixth public school. Cr. Smith and Hildebrandt opposed the transfer.
- A new taxi by-law was passed, with opposition from the mayor, reeve and Cr. Hildebrandt who claim it is too lengthy and contains clauses which are not deemed.
- An advertising sign for Sunucks Real Estate beside the Delrex office building was denied as contravening the building by-law. The mayor and reeve disagreed and Deputy Reeve Hunter refrained from voting because he is in the same business.
- Purchase of a new Champion grader, costing \$10,467 was decided, with Cr. Pow dissenting.
- Seeking a zoning change for property he owns at the John - McNabb corner from its present conservation status to commercial, A. G. Turnbull was advised to consult the planning board. He had turned a \$3,000 offer from the town to acquire the property.
- Alex McLaren told council the Conservation Authority will install picnic tables and waste containers at any town locations which council might wish.
- The 1964 agreement with the Police Ass'n was finalized.
