Each secondary school in the province is allowed one male student delegate but because GHS is also pending an instructor the allowance is increased to two.

Need Another Building To Handle Hen Horde

Equipping Farms, the home of the mass egg production business on the 7th Line of Esquimaux, North of Hornby Store will be filled with 12,000 laying hens. Cliff Wrigglesworth who manages the business says the extra pen will mean hiring another man so this will mean 22,000 layers to be cared for. Automatic feeding, watering and egg gathering devices and music piped in to soothe the producers. The eggs are sold at the Town Line, south of Norval.

WEED SEEDS TRAVEL

At this time of year we become weed conscious because many varieties have just begun flowering. Fields which appeared to be free of weeds a week or so ago are now adorned with nearly every colour of the rainbow. "Where do all the weeds come from?" They weren't here last year? Many farmers, gardeners and weed-conscious residents have made such remarks and their concern about the spread of weeds is quite justified.

They have not come down with the summer rain or the winter snow, but nature has had a hand in establishing them in their new place of business. Wind is one of nature's greatest helpers and weeds are equipped to take full advantage of this free transportation. Canada thistle, Goose Grass, Milkweed and dandelion are a few examples whose seeds are equipped with built-in parachutes. Other varieties such as Wild Carrot and tumbling mustard also take advantage of the wind but tumble over the ground or the snow to their destinations.

Nature has made it possible for other weeds such as burrs to latch onto clothing, dogs, sheep or cattle just to be miserable, but in this way they reach new green pastures where there is more room to grow. Birds too are definitely responsible for planting seeds in new locations. Most weed seeds are good sailors and so also use streams and ditches as a means of hitchhiking to other areas.

While nature aids in the propagation of weeds in numerous and ingenious ways, man himself is a much more powerful force than either wind, birds or water when it comes to travelling long distances. The movement of seed, feed, machinery and other supplies has carried more weeds farther than all the natural agencies combined. The Atlantic Ocean was no barrier to weed seeds because according to the Canada Department of Agriculture most of our weeds are of European origin introduced to North America in seed and feed brought over by our early settlers.

Many residents inquire about control of thistles in pastures.

The following are the chemical controls suggested by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Canada Thistle
(1) 16 to 24 ozs. 2, 4-D acid as ester per acre applied in late spring.
(2) MCPB and MCPA (15:1) mixtures 24 ozs. acid as sodium salts applied in late spring. This treatment could be used if some legumes were present in the field.

(3) AMITROL 4 lbs. active per 50 gals. water. Apply about the heading stage of the thistle and spray until the foliage is wet; use spot treatments because this chemical will damage grasses. Do not graze pastures for two weeks following AMITROL application. More than one treatment with these chemicals will be necessary for eradication.
