WHAT COUNCIL DID

MOST OF THE WORK FINISHED SO REDUCE BOND—BAINES

A letter from T. Baines, solicitor, to F. A. Heaton, the town solicitor, asking that Robert Lane's bond of \$75,000 to guarantee the finishing of the roads in the Lane subdivision be reduced to around \$15,000 sparked a long discussion at Monday night's council meeting.

Mr. Baines contended that 80 to 90 per cent of the work is done, so the bond should be reduced to cover the amount of work left to be done.

"We have met with Mr. Lane many times on this subject," said the deputy reeve, "we suggested he either put up a bond,

or put so much money in the bank, and we'll do the job, and keep account of the costs. We should see the bond is reinstated," he concluded.

"You mean there is no bond at all," queried the mayor. "If not how can they ask for a reduction?"

"The bond had lapsed when Mr. Lane attended the last meeting," added Coun. Emerson, "as far as I know it has not been renewed."

Coun. D. Powers went on — "Last December the bond ran out. I'd recommend that we demand the bond be made retroactive to January, 1964. If we come to a reasonable agreement, then we can reduce the bond."

"We are safe with a \$75,000 bond, maintained Reeve J. Elliott, "and it should be a continuing bond until the work is done."

All voted in favour of instructing the solicitor the bond has to be renewed in the full amount of \$75,000.

The absence of a workshop for retarded persons over the age of 18 in this district was apparent when students of the Sunshine School for the Retarded on the 7th Line entertained their parents and friends.

The 21 students, ranging from 5 to 18 years, sang, danced, performed numerous skills, demonstrated the exercises done at school and read poems at St. Paul's United Church, 10000 Keele Street, Milliken. Guided by their teachers, Mrs. Jean Mitchell and Mr. Doris Hill, the students performed to the piano music of their principal teacher, Mrs. Gwen Jefferson.

The students had been rehearsing the program since last year and should be commended for their efforts.

The lack of workshop facilities to occupy the minds of students leaving at the age of 18, was noted when John Ambrose, 18, received a gift watch from the students as a remembrance of his 10 years.

John, and a girl who has moved to the Guelph area, Diane Ruak, 18, will be the only students ever to receive such an award from the school. The pair were the school's first students and thus the first to graduate.

Presenting the awards was past president of the Halton Association for Retarded Children, Gerry Addison. Addison said later plans are being considered for starting a workshop in the district but would not be completed in the near future.

Mrs. Mitchell remarked there is a workshop in Burlington but the cost of transportation approximately \$8,000 a year, is too great. She said John now has nowhere to go but home.

Tears were visible in students' eyes as they approached John to say goodbye and to shake his hand. John said "thank you and proudly displayed his new watch for everyone to see."

Will Hold Drowning Inquest in Council Chamber

A coroner's jury will hear the facts surrounding the drowning at Terra Cotta, June 21st, at an inquest in the Georgetown municipal building Wednesday, July 20th. The inquest date was first reported as Thursday, July 6th.

The victim, Lucky Morrison, Toronto, a non-swimmer was discovered floating face-down in the Terra Cotta CVCA park pool shortly after a search was organized. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Georgetown's hospital.

Meanwhile recommendations made during an inquest into the death of an 8 year old Brampton boy who drowned the same day at Kelsa dam

near Milton are yielding results. Ralph Sherwood, chairman of the Halton Region Conservation Authority said: "We are very interested in the recommendations made by the jury that a police officer be in the area and we hope to carry it out this week-end."

Sherwood said the recommendations made by M. A. McMartin, director of water safety for the Ontario Red Cross will certainly be acted on and carried out.

"The HRCA is as much concerned about the safety of our children as anyone," Sherwood noted.

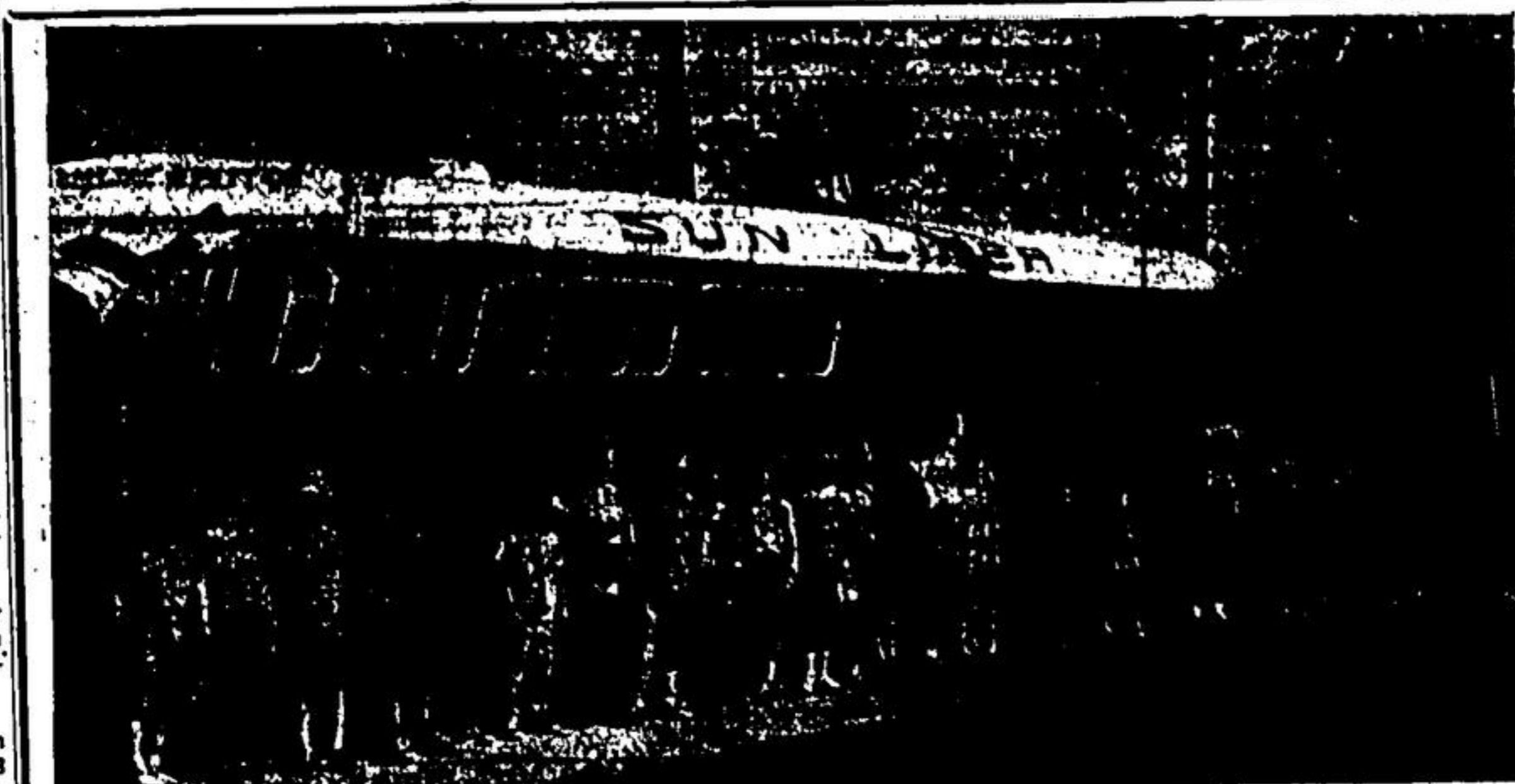
David Murray, field officer of the HRCA has been instructed

to notify the Toronto office to inform them of intentions to make a present employee a qualified police officer, Sherwood announced.

Off-duty constables from either provincial detachments or local town police will be approached and asked if they would consider patrolling the area on weekends, he said.

"A number of the recommendations have already been attended to such as a motor and a boat and surf boards," Sherwood said, adding two boards should be at the lake this week-end.

"The representation the HRCA had at the inquest last night indicates that we are concerned," Sherwood concluded.

Posies And More Posies Council's Monday Nosegay

There was a plethora of posies at Council meeting Monday night. They appeared first in a bill for \$50 read out in the accounts by Cr. Powers. Cr. W. Smith questioned the bill saying that someone was given the posies last year providing the slips be kept for this year.

"I never heard of it," replied Cr. Powers. These would be at the water works and the pump house.

Next Cr. Francis read another bill for geraniums and posies. "More posies," commented Cr. Smith. Cr. Francis admitted he didn't know where they were. "I haven't seen these flowers," he said. "However, now I will check on them."

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And still more posies were mentioned when the town foreman was authorized to landscape the corner of Guelph and Main, where the War Memorial used to stand. Cr. Young stated it was an unsightly mess, and could be beautified with something reasonable like posies.

Deputy Reeve Hunter felt it would be much better to cut the corner back and improve the turning. Council agreed but felt that the cutting of the corner would probably not be done this year that the landscaping would be a temporary measure to beautify of the corner.

Reeve J. Elliott suggested that the Horticultural Society might be interested in the site. Despite this suggestion, the motion to have the town foreman install a flower bed at the corner passed unanimously.

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
